

Of the English and Welsh seats there is reason to believe that 29 will be transferred from the Conservatives to the Liberals."

The Central News Association reports that it has received a communication from Hartmann acknowledging that he was chosen by the Nihilist committee to assassinate the Czar, and giving a detailed account of his attempt at Moscow. Hartmann concludes by saying that he intends to emigrate to America in a few days.

Herbert Gladstone, son of Hon. W. E. Gladstone is a candidate for Middlesex. Success is hardly expected, at the last election Conservative majority was double the Liberal vote.

FRANCE.—It is possible that difficulties in the way of applying the Ferry Educational Bill will compel the Government to submit a new bill.

SWITZERLAND.—A meeting of officers of the Federal army, held at Berne, adopted a resolution that the erection of fortifications on the western frontier is indispensable for the security of the country.

GERMANY.—In view of comprehensive concessions made by the Pope in regard to the appointment of priests, he yields the main point in dispute between the Vatican and Berlin.

The Pope having made the concession that the names of the priests appointed to livings are henceforth to be officially communicated by bishops to the secular authorities, peace between Berlin and the Vatican has become possible. About a thousand vacant livings will be refilled and some vexatious clauses of ecclesiastical laws repealed.

As the first concession to the Pope, the Bishop of Strasburg will be permitted to reopen his seminary for the education of persons intending to become priests.

RUSSIA.—Russia will decline to hold communications with the new Chinese Ambassador until his Government has ratified the Livadia treaty, and the Chinese are already making inroads into Russian territory. The embroglio grows darker and more complicated.

The Minister of the Interior has again prohibited the *Golos* from publishing advertisements for two months.

GREECE.—In the Chamber of Deputies the Opposition moved a resolution declaring the budget not adapted the financial condition of the country, and expressing disapproval of the policy of the Government.

CHINA.—The Pekin authorities have condemned to death Chug How, the late Ambassador to Russia. He was originally suspended on the pretext that he had returned without Imperial permission. His stipulations with Russia are considered unpatriotic and prejudicial to the dignity of China. The decision carries with it grave complications between China and Russia, for the Czar will certainly resent the severe punishment of the envoy.

The Chinese army is being armed with modern weapons and foreign drill masters are instructing Chinese soldiers. The defenses of the coast are being strengthened and preparations made for calling out the irregular volunteers, who are only mustered in the gravest crisis of the state.

SOUTH AFRICA.—The General Post Office at Cape Town, was robbed of all the diamonds awaiting to be shipped by mail. They are valued at £75,000.
