PROVINCIAL APPOINTMENT.—*Cumberland Co.*—To be a Justice of the Peace—Robert McKim, Six Mile Road, Wallace.

The body of a young woman, believed to be that of the daughter of Mr. Henry Boyle was found in the woods on the St. Margaret's Bay Road on Sunday morning. The body was so far decomposed, as to be beyond recognition. The clothes aided in determining who she was. It appears that she was subject to fits of something like temporary insanity, during which she at times disappeared, but turned up again after a short absence. About last November, she left the house to make some purchases in town and was never heard of afterwards, though diligent search was made in the city and her absence was advertised in the papers.

The effects of the storm of thunder and lightning were found to have been much greater than we supposed last week. One of our morning papers mentions that a house in the northern part of the city was struck by lightning. The chimney was knocked down, all the windows in the front were blown out, nearly every door in the house was shattered. The lightning seemed to have fairly separated the fibres of wood in some places, and people who visited the house next morning gathered up handfuls of wooden shreds as relics. The passage of the electric fluid could not be traced as in most cases of the kind, but it almost seemed as if it originated in the house itself and made its exit. Some articles of furniture were broken, a bed in which a child was sleeping was set on fire, but was extinguished before very much damage was done. A silver watch hanging on the wall of one of the rooms was smashed. The plaster was knocked down in several places and yet not one of the persons sleeping in the house were injured in the slightest degree.

Large fires were burning in the woods on the other side of the N. W. Arm on Sunday last. Ashes from them were falling in the harbor, and even at Dartmouth.

ACADIA COLLEGE ANNIVERSARY.—A number of distinguished visitors have been invited by the Alumni of the College and have signified their intention to be present at the anniversary on Thursday, among whom are their Excellencies Sir Patrick McDougall, Admiral McClintock and His Honor Governor Archibald. The special train will leave Halifax at 7.15 a. m. Thursday, and return the same evening. Return Tickets one dollar and fifty cents.

A fire broke out at Berwick about 10.30 o'clock on Saturday night in Mr. Leander Chute's barn, and destroyed Mr. Chute's house, shop and barn, Mr. Halliday's house and barn, Mr. Shaw's house, Mr. Bent's hotel and an empty store and barn belonging to Mr. S. J. Nichols. The value of the property destroyed is \$7,000. It is insured for about \$2,200.

The Acadia Foundry at New Glasgow, caught fire on Thursday last. Before the fire engines could be got in proper working order, the fire had extended to boiler and blacksmith's shops, all of which are completely destroyed. No insurance.

William Garrett and Charles Newell arrived at Canso on Monday of last week, from the Western Banks in a dory, having got astray from the schr. *George Clarke, Jr.*, on the 21st inst. They picked up an old bed sack and made a sail, and with their paddles succeeded in making land, subsisting in the meantime on fresh halibut, raw.

Ship *Borneo*, of New York, Captain Shaw, oil laden, from New Orleans for Trieste, was dismasted on the 15th May. She temporarily repaired damage and tried to make Halifax Harbor. During a dense fog on the 23rd inst. struck on Beaver Island ledge. The vessel is a total loss.

Richard Christie's steam saw mill, Salmon River, two miles above Truro, was burnt on Friday. Loss \$8,000 to \$10,000; \$1,000 worth of lumber was burned.

Mr. W. H. Rogers placed one of his new Fishways in the river at Milton, Queens, and a number of the leading inhabitants of Milton have signed a paper expressing satisfaction with its working.

The anniversary exercises of Mount Allison Institutions, at Sackville, N. B., began on Saturday afternoon.

Monday morning was occupied with the anniversary exercises of the Male Academy. Stirring declamations, original and selected, were given by a number of the students.

Dr. Allison being called on spoke as a student of the Academy upward of a quarter of a century ago.

In the evening Dr. Pope, of St. John, lectured on the "Immortality of the soul."

Heavy showers during the day somewhat affected the size of the audiences. The Ladies Academy Exercises were to occupy Tuesday.

The Wolfville *Star* announces that it will change hands on the 1st of July next.

A treasure trove was turned up a few days ago, by Mr. Edw. Davidson of Upper Falmouth. It consisted of 12 pieces of plate. The edge of one of the pieces was thrown up to the surface by the frost, so he removed the dirt away and found the others. The farm on which these plates were found is the old Castle Frederick farm, that was formerly inhabited by the French, and afterwards owned by Governor DesBarres, father of the present Judge DesBarres. Relics have, from time to time, been dug up on this farm.

Mr. Chas. McNeil, of Westport, Digby, was drowned on Friday the 21st inst. He and his son, a lad about 15 years of age, were out in a boat in St. Mary's Bay fishing, when the boat capsized in a squall. The father, who was a good swimmer, placed the son on the keel of boat and struck for the shore for assistance, as the boat could hardly float with the boy on it. When near the shore, hearing the screams of his terrified boy, he returned towards the boat. Other boats were soon at hand, the boy was rescued from his perilous position, and the lifeless body of the heroic father found floating upon the waters of the Bay, was borne to land. He left a wife and five children.—*Chronicle.*

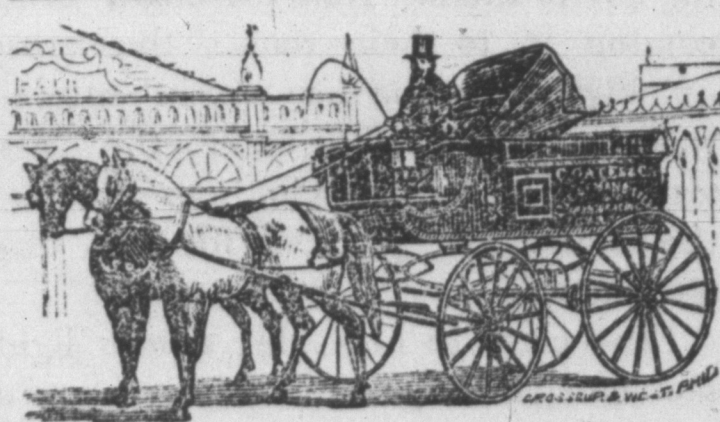

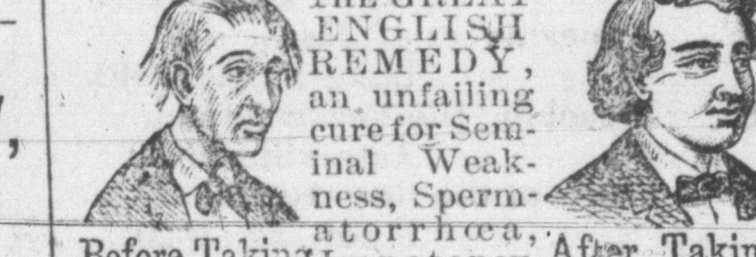
