

A religious census of the students of Harvard College gives six hundred as belonging to the Episcopal, Congregational, Baptists, and other orthodox denominations, while the number of Unitarians and Agnostics with others who may be classed with them, are only some three hundred and fifty. There are but 214 Unitarians to 275 Episcopalians. The College can no longer be said to be a stronghold of Unitarian sentiment. The future of a college depends very much on the tendencies of thought among its students, as its trustees and professors are generally chosen from among its own graduates. These facts indicate a change in the theological position and influence of this great institution.

It is now two months since Messrs. Moody and Sankey left the Pacific coast, yet the gospel meetings and the noon-day prayer-meetings have kept up with unabated interest; the former every night except Saturday, and the latter every day except Sunday.

In the first fortnight after the Papal interdict was laid upon Father Curci's new book, 7,000 copies were sold in Italy alone, and a new edition is already in preparation. This result should be a lesson to the Holy Father not to advertise by mention in the "Index Expurgatorius" works which he does not want the people to read.

A religious body having resolved to build a new church, the pastor went about begging very zealously, accepting not only the widow's but the child's mite. 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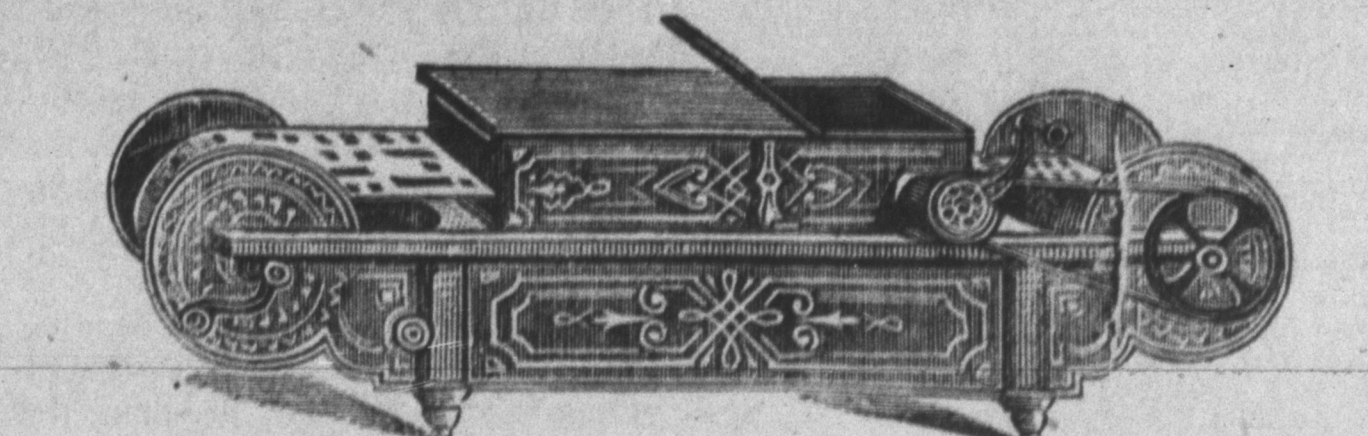
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
