At Clarence, Annapolis, 8th ult., Chas. Bishop, son of Edward C. and Caroline Bishop, aged 31 years.

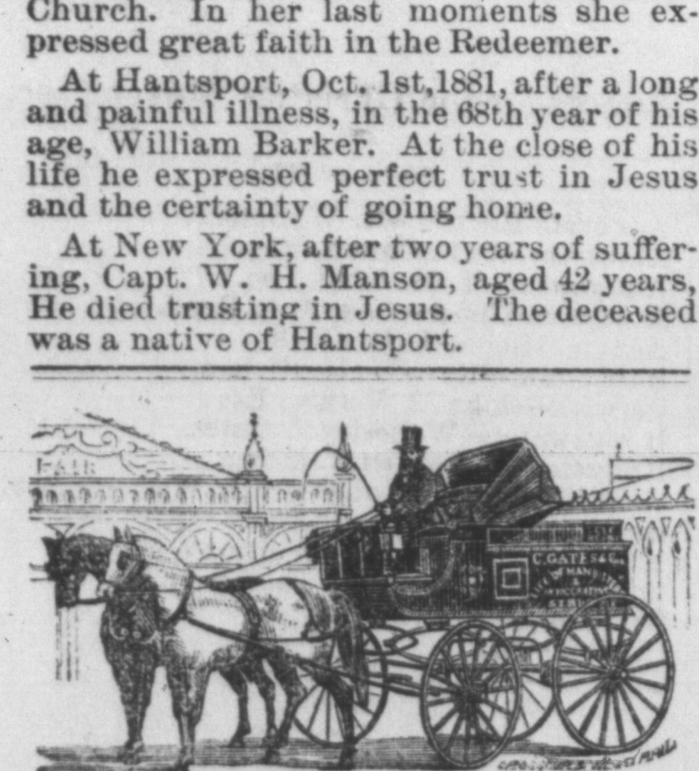
At Granville Ferry, 20th ult., Eliza, wife of Robert Delap, Esq., aged 57 years.
