ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

The Royal Mail Steamer *Arabia* arrived at New York on Tuesday, the 23d inst, bringing one week's later intelligence.

The news by this arrival is not at all decisive with reference to the Eastern question, and no important intelligence has been received from China as to the progress of the insurrection.

GREAT BRITAIN.—In Parliament Mr. Peel mentioned that proposals were made to the late Government to send out two regiments of Swiss to the Cape of Good Hope, to keep the Caffir frontier in check, but no farther steps had been taken in the matter.

FRANCE.—A rumor has been circulating that the coronation of the emperor and the empress will take place in September, in which case the archbishop of Paris will officiate instead of the Pope.

ITALY.—Nine persons had been condemned to imprisonment for forty months, on a charge of being members of an evangelical and political society, for purposes hostile to the religion and Government of the country. Guerazzi has been permitted to take up his residence in France.

RUSSIA AND TURKEY.—There is little or nothing new to add to last advices. It is said that a telegraphic dispatch has been received in Paris from Vienna, announcing the acceptance by the Divan of the Austrian proposals. There can be little doubt that the proposals will be accepted by the Porte, but the statement that they have been already accepted is premature. The London Morning Post states that the Russian troops will be withdrawn from the principalities in the first week of September, and that soon afterwards the fleets will retire from Beskia Bay.

CENTRAL AMERICA.—The treaty between the Republic of Costa Rica and Pope Pius IX., dated October 7, 1852, has been concluded and confirmed with much ceremony.

The character of the contract thus formed and ratified may be readily guessed.

It establishes the Roman Catholic religion as the religion of the republic. The educational institutions are placed under the control of the clergy, and all instructions must conform to the requirements of the Catholic Church. The choice of books and writings pertaining to religious and moral doctrines is left entirely to the Bishops.

A letter from Rome states "that the Pope has been laid up with a scalded foot." Punch says he does not wonder at this, since the Holy Father has been for a long time in *hot water*. News of the 12th from Rome states that the health of the Pope is daily becoming more precarious. He is suffering from a severe attack of asthma and general debility. The Pope is 61 years of age.

THE YELLOW FEVER AT NATCHEZ.—Over 200 Deaths!—People leaving the City.—A dispatch dated on Saturday, the 20th, says: "The yellow fever has existed in this city for several days, having, it is supposed, been brought here by some vessel from New Orleans. Up to the present writing, upward of two hundred deaths have taken place: the excitement is very great. Many persons have left the city, and others are leaving. A large building has been provided, which is to be used as a hospital for the indigent sick."

RAILROAD ACCIDENTS.—On the 10th ult. a terrible collision took place on the Camden and Amboy Railroad, New Jersey, between the train from New York and the one from Philadelphia, by which four persons were killed and seven others wounded. On the New York and New Haven Railroad the next morning (11th) the night train came in contact with a mass of rock which had rolled down on the track, by which the engineer was killed and the fireman severely wounded. And in connection with the above cases, another melancholy collision took place on the Providence and Worcester Railroad, on the morning of the 12th ult. by which 12 persons were killed, and 25 more or less injured.

The total number of railroad accidents in the United States, from the 1st of January to August 12th, was 65, involving the loss of one hundred and seventy-six lives, and wounding three hundred and thirty-three persons. This is certainly an appalling aggregate.

ARREST.—An arrest was made here on Saturday night, of a man for horse stealing in Houlton. On examining his trunk, the watches stolen some weeks since from Mr. Whites' store in Fredericton, was discovered.—He was lodged in jail.

BROWN THE FORGER.—This miserable swindler was arrested about 60 miles beyond Houlton, brought back to this City, and has been found guilty—sentence not yet passed.

BELLS.—A peal of eight bells has been imported for the Cathedral in Fredericton, at a cost of £530 sterling.

A public dinner was given in Montreal, on the 19th ult., to Mr. Stephenson, the distinguished civil engineer. Tickets \$12 each.

NEW ORLEANS.—The interments in New Orleans on the 21st ult., was 315. The number of deaths reported on the 22nd, was 283, of which 265 were by yellow fever.

We have been informed by a clerical friend, who had occasion to preach near the railroad operations a little beyond Richmond, that drunkenness & riotous assaults are fearfully common among the navies. On a Sabbath afternoon, he counted six or eight persons lying by the way-side in a state of intoxication, within little more than half a mile; and he himself was assaulted by some men under the influence of drink. Since then, we understand, several convictions have been had, and fines inflicted under the new act, which we hope will work well.—*Montreal Witness*.
