THE EASTERN QUESTION.

Our information on the Eastern Question is as vague as ever. In Britain, the public appear to have decided that the matter either is settled, or will be settled without more ado, and therefore, little or nothing is now said on the subject. At Paris, (says a letter,) the opinion of many political persons is the same as that expressed by the Austrian and Russian Embassies, namely, that the Emperor of Russia will raise no objection to the modification made by the Porte, in the Vienna note. But this opinion is not that which prevails among the Russians recently arrived at Paris. A few days will prove how far they are correct, but it is certain that many of them receive assurance of the evacuation of the Miss Maria Wesley Dodge, both of this city. They are, no doubt, as ignorant as we all are of the secret intentions of the Czar, but they probably fairly represent the opinion of the great majority of their fellow citizens. This, however, is merely private opinion, and is not the language of Russian diplomacy. At all events a few days will show.
