Had Mr. Boulter been afraid of this fine gentleman, because he was rich and godless, and if he had been ashamed to own his Master before him, and plead his cause, he would not have had the honor of directing this poor wanderer to Jesus. Let those write ,for God to whom God has given the power, and let those who cannot write themselves, diffuse the godly publications of others. Many are thus converted who will not go to hear the preached gospel.
