THE SUBMARINE AND TRANSATLANTIC TEL FGRAPH.-Tha submarine electric telegraph cable for the New York, Newfoundland as I ondon Telegraph Company, was successfully laid on the 10th last., from the steam the direction of Mr. S. Canning, across the Gulf of St. Lawrence, between Cape Re Cove, N. F., and Asbhy Bay, C. B., a di tance of 85 miles, in fifteen hours. Message ture now being freely and instantaneous transmitted from shore to shore. The Conrany have about 700 men at work in New foundland and on Cape Breton. The Newfoundland Line from St. Johns to the point where it intersects with the Lines of the American Telegraph Company in Nova Scotis, will be about 600 miles in length, and it is confidently expected that the whole will be completed, and in successful operation by the first of September, and from arrangements already completed, it is also expected by the Company that the cable to conne Newfoundland and Ireland will be laid down during the ensuing year.
