After all the hopes of religious freedom that were anticipated from the war, and all the reforms promised by the Sultan and guaranteed by his edicts, it is painful to learn that not only have these bright anticipations been dashed, but that Christian missions in Turkey have lately encountered renewed hostility.

Naples.

We make the following extract from the French Correspondent to the N. Y. Observer, on the condition of Naples:—"Ferdinand II., King of the Two Sicilies, is not merely a despot; he is a maniac; to his passion for absolute power, he unites the lowest, cruellest instincts.

The King of Naples belongs to the Bourbon family. He was born in January, 1810, and has been on the throne since 1830.

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the frightful atrocities of this Bourbon seem to them too much! Ferdinand, however, finds some defender. Pope Pius IX. lauds his piety and virtues before the civilized world! The editors of the Universe,—the Jesuit and Ultramontane journal,—publish long articles in favour of this crowned monster! But they only injure themselves by such apologies; they show that the spirit of the Inquisition is not extinct in them, and that they are ready to perpetrate the same atrocities as Ferdinand II. in the same circumstances.

A word upon the position of the great powers in this conflict. Russia, by the pen of Prince Gortschakoff, now minister of Foreign Affairs, has published a singular note, seemingly offering to protect the King of Naples. This diplomatic document is written in a flippant, haughty style, and has revolved the public sentiment. The Count Nesselrode never used such language. It is said now that the Czar Alexander had no knowledge of his minister's strange letter. So much the better, if true; but Prince Gortschakoff will do well hereafter to be more circumspect, particularly as Russia has just received so severe a lesson.

Austria has acted in this matter with her usual art and cunning. She promises to exert her influence with the King of Naples to exert from him some concessions; but his meddled on effect thus far, and it is supposed, not unreasonably, that the cabinet of Vienna is playing a double game. Let Austria take care! perfidy does not succeed long, but reacts sooner or later against its perpetrators.

England is the most resolute in her intervention. Her squadron is ready to enter the Bay of Naples. The British Government has here a noble part to act: to propagate liberty in the south of Italy as in the rest of the continent. But France is less decided, and it is easy to see why. For Louis Napoleon is restricted by both religious and political considerations. The Pope is near the King of Naples, and the pontifical triple crown would be threatened with the same blow which should strike that of Ferdinand II. Besides, if a great insurrection of the people should break out in the Peninsula, would it not extend into France, and what would become then of the military dictatorship of the new Napoleon? However this may be, the crisis is at hand. Let us hope it will advance the cause of justice, liberty and human happiness.
