

EUROPE.

ARRIVAL OF THE NIAGARA.

Latest from Europa!

The Niagara, from Liverpool, about 9 30 A. M., on Saturday, 16th, arrived at Halifax on Monday, 25th, at 8 45, P. M.

The Canadian arrived at Liverpool on Thursday, the 13th. A lamentable accident occurred on board the Canadian on her homeward passage. The Revd. Wm. Marsh died in mistake a quantity of disinfecting fluid, and notwithstanding every care it proved fatal.

From every part of the United Kingdom, the harvest reports are of a favorable character, and little doubt is now entertained that the grain crops will be, at least, a fair average in quantity and quality. In Scotland the crops are very heavy. With respect to potatoes, also, there is general concurrence of evidence that the crop, though not entirely free from disease in some parts of England, Ireland and Scotland, promises to be abundant and excellent. Late rains have been beneficial to green crops. Harvest operations are now general, and so much labour is wanted that farmers have obliged railway contractors, who find themselves compelled to suspend for the present all but pressing public works.

Sir S. Morton Peto, in a letter, suggests that the government might wisely imitate the example of that of France, and permit the soldiers of regiments stationed in the rural districts to earn wages by helping to gather the harvest.

In the political world there reigns the profoundest quietness, leaving nothing worth reporting.

The following extraordinary paragraph is from the editorial columns of the London Star:—

There are some very unhappy rumors floating all over Paris, about the state of things established at the Tuileries, which, it is very much to be hoped, are entirely without foundation. Moreover the statesmen's gathering strength, and they are repeated from day to day. No doubt the legitimist and republican parties in Paris will take care that the stories do not lose excited interest in the repetition, and we are sorry to add that the character of the Empress herself continues to be cruelly aspersed. Now that the Emperor returns to Paris, it ought to be his first duty to bring the authors of those calumnies to justice."

SPANISH.—Spanish news is uninteresting. Reports in the Gazette de France, which require confirmation, are to the effect that disturbances had arisen at Cadix in disarming the national guard; but with this exception, the general disarming is everywhere being carried out without resistance. Fears entertained of severity were diminishing.

ITALY.—A report was circulated on the Paris Bourse, that there had been an attempt at an insurrection in Naples; it turns out, however, to be untrue, and from the precautions taken to prevent such attempts, they are not likely to take place.

It was reported that the Submarine Telegraph cable from Sardinia to Algiers was broken and lost in the laying; this was incorrect; an accident happened to it, but this was not serious.—The latest despatch concerning it, dated the 13th, says—"We are successfully proceeding with raising the cable to make the junction, and advance towards Algeria."

MADRID.—The mail brings disastrous accounts from Madrid. Dates are to the 13th of August. In Funchal alone there had been 5000 cases of cholera, and 1500 deaths, out of a population of 25,000. Both medicines and physicians were deficient. The dead remain unburied, and fires were kept burning to mitigate the pestilence arising from the putrefaction of the corpses.

THE EAST.—The last English war steamer "Gladiator," has returned from the Isles of Serpents to Constantinople, and reports that there were but fifty Turkish and eight Russian soldiers on the island, and that there was no armed seizure of it as reported. The island is nothing but a bare rock of very limited size, and contains only one building; the Turks and Russians lie together, and the latter are treated by the former as guests.

RUSSIA.—The Archbishop of Kherson has formerly consecrated the south side of Sebastopol, preparatory to its being rebuilt. Russian consular agents are now authorized to grant passports immediately. Russian Quarantine regulations are re-established in Russian ports of the Black Sea and the Sea of Azov as before the war. It is confirmed that Russia is constructing a first class naval arsenal on the island of Kashi, in the Gulf of Botnia.

The Harvest in Asia is reported bad, but considerable stores remain from last year. The Paris paper, "Nord," affirms that the Russian Government has made concession of railway lines to capitalists extending to upwards of 3000 English miles.

BREADSTUFFS.—Prospects of most abundant harvest continue to expand. Imports of Foreign grain unusually large. The market assumes an unsound aspect. Wheat 31 dearer. Flour steady without change. Corn advanced 6d.

IN THE SEA IN AFRICA.—Dr. Robinson, a missionary, has verified the existence, in Africa, of an immense sea without outlet, twice as large as the Black Sea, between the equator and ten degrees south latitude, and between the twenty-third and thirtieth meridians.

CHINA.—Yanchow has been added to the possessions of the rebels, and 2000 imperialists have been made prisoners. The Abbe Michon, a Catholic priest of Paris, has published a pamphlet to demonstrate that the Pope ought to renounce all secular authority, and remove to Jerusalem, there to preside over the Christian church.

Four young ladies recently took the white veil of the Sisters of Charity, at St. Joseph's convent, ten miles from Dubuque, Iowa; and on the same day six novices made their religious profession and took the black veil, the final act of separation from the world.

A civil war still goes on in China. Sixty-five rebels were beheaded in Canton, not long since, in one day. Rev. Phineas Stowe, of the Seaman's Bethel, Boston, recently baptized a man-of-war's man, who had previously to a few months past, led a life of dissipation. He is connected with the Mercantile, and with tears expressed his determination to labor for the salvation of his beloved shipmates.

Russian Evasion.

The peace which was so lately concluded has been on the eve of a rupture. We are not sure that even now all danger is over. Ever since the ratification of the treaty, the Russians have manifested a disposition, in every possible manner, to evade its provisions and to violate its spirit. We have adverted, on former occasions, to the discreditable policy displayed in the retention of some places, and in rendering those useless which they found they could no longer retain. The occupation of the Isle of Serpents called forth the astonishment and indignation of all Europe. In this emergency, it is satisfactory to find that the British Government has acted with becoming spirit. Without so far as appears, waiting to consult our Allies, the British Ministry ordered our fleet to re-enter the Black Sea, and to cruise there till all the stipulations of the late treaty were point by point fulfilled. It is rumored that this promptitude was not altogether to the mind of our French allies; and it is certain that no French vessels have joined the British squadron. But, however that may be, the threat involved in this one resolute measure appears to have had the desired effect. The Russians say they have sent peremptory orders to evacuate Kars, and they express their willingness to give up the Isle of Serpents. So far the ground of quarrel is removed; but it is melancholy to reflect how little of good faith Russia seems disposed to manifest, and how many difficulties may yet interpose before the full accomplishment of the treaty. We believe, however, that the peace will be found an angry for the future—that the boldest course will prove to be the safest.—Christian Times.
