

KANSAS.—A letter from Gov. Geary to Kansas, dated 19th instant, announces the restoration of peace in that Territory. He says that for two weeks no outrages have been reported, and that many of the most notorious characters have left the country. He adds that he will shortly proceed with a small force in pursuit of a gang of thieves in the Southern portion of the Territory.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4th.—6 P. At Lowell, Mass., on Monday afternoon, John Humphries and William Carberry, laboring men, accidentally blew themselves up, by smoking pipes in Whipple's powder drying house. There was very little powder in the place, but both men were burned to death.

The Chicago Times of the 21st, says:—There was over two millions bushels of grain in this city yesterday; to be exact, 2,163,614 bushels. Part of it, to wit, 714,866 bushels, was on board, and formed the cargoes of forty-nine vessels, which were lying in the harbor, waiting for a favorable wind, and ready to sail. The remaining 1,448,758 bushels were in store in the various warehouses along the river.

The OCEAN TELEGRAPH.—The action of the Board of Aldermen tending the freedom of the city to the officers and crew of the U. S. steamer Arctic, of the ocean surveying expedition, was a well deserved compliment, for they have fully demonstrated the feasibility of connecting the two continents by a telegraphic wire, and in this circumstance the prospective relations of the largest commercial nations of the globe are intimately involved. The bed of the ocean was found to vary but slightly from a plane, thus effecting a considerable saving in the length of the wire, compared with what might have been reasonably expected. The arrangements for laying the wire are not yet complete. Mr. Field being at present in England with reference to this matter, but we learn that the telegraphic connection between this port and St. John, New Foundland, is very nearly complete. An unexpected delay arose from a miscalculation as to the length of the wire required for going through Nova Scotia, necessitated by inaccurate surveys, so that it was necessary to return England and procure twenty-five miles additional—making the whole length of atmospheric wire one hundred and twenty-five miles.

This portion is nearly finished, and the two sub-marine cables between St. John and Prince Edward's Island and across the Gulf of St. Lawrence, one over fifteen miles in length, and the other eighty-five, are found to be complete and in the best working order. The entire expenditure on this important enterprise, up to the present time, is between \$600,000 and \$700,000. The cost of the ocean survey is defrayed by the U. S. Government. We are informed that the Telegraph Company feel under great obligations to Secretary Dobbin, for the valuable co-operation afforded by him in the prosecution of his part of the work. Prof. Hache rendered important service.—[Jour. of Com.]

THE CONTRIBUTIONS OF THE SANDWICH ISLANDERS.—The religious and charitable contributions of the Christian natives of the Sandwich Islands amounted, says the Pitkin Recorder, during the last year, to within a fraction of Nineteen Thousand dollars. The debt of the American Board in August, 1855, was twenty thousand dollars; in August, 1855, sixteen thousand dollars more had accumulated, so that the whole sum was then \$36,180 70. If the Christians of this country contributed as largely, in proportion to their number and means, as the Sandwich Islanders, that debt would be swept away in a single hour.

EUROPE.
(By Telegraph to News Room.)
Arrival of the "Canada" at Halifax.
LATEST FROM EUROPE.
The "Canada" from Liverpool 3h 30 A. M., Saturday 25th arrived at Halifax Nov. 5th 4:45 P. M. Baltic 7th on Wednesday 22nd. Steamer Fulton from Havre sailed from Cowes early morning 23rd for New York 200 passengers and full general cargo. Indian arrived morning 22nd at Liverpool from Quebec. Fulton also Canadian and Quebec steamers carried out a brief manifesto from the Paris Monitor on subject of Napoleon's affairs. Monitor said that when Congress of Paris broke up the great powers saw elements fraught with danger to peace in Belgium, Greece, Naples; that of these States Naples alone refused to accept friendly advice and that in consequence the Western Powers will cease diplomatic intercourse. The article in the Monitor is the only authentic glimpse the public has yet had of what is going on and there is nothing additional to add in the way of news. The British fleet is somewhere in the Mediterranean. The French ships continue to be at Toulon ready for sea. Maritime despatches are contradictory, one statement says the ministers will not leave Naples for some months, another says that Baron Breuer the French envoy announced to the Neapolitan Govt. that if he did not receive satisfactory communication within two hours he would present his last instructions, said instructions being doubtless to demand his passports.

The statement that the Emperor of Russia has urged the King of Naples to avoid total rupture by making some concessions seems confirmed by numerous communications in the continental papers. The Cologne and the Independence Belg two generally reliable journals express themselves very positively on the subject.

This advice of the Emperor, it seems, was that King Ferdinand should change some of his ministry, and place Prince Salvo at its head, while warning him against the ill-will of England. The Emperor is further represented as having recommended to the King to trust to the mediation of the Emperor of the French, and to accept him as a mediator.

The Austrian Gazette has received a communication from Naples to the effect that King Ferdinand to show his conciliatory disposition, will not recall his representatives in Paris and London in consequence of the recall of the French and English ambassadors to Naples. They will only leave these capitals in case their passports are sent. The only authority for this statement is the Austrian organ, which also professes to be able to say what the demands of the British Government really are, that is to say: 1st a change of Government, 2nd, abolition of present police system, 3rd, a general amnesty. On the same authority it may be stated that the French Cabinet would be satisfied if a general amnesty were granted.

The hopes of a speedy reassembling of the Paris Conference begin to be spoken.

The resistance is said to come from the English Government, whose views seem to prevail.

BRITAIN.—Parliament is further prorogued till Dec. 16th.

The citizens of Dublin gave a banquet Wednesday, 22nd, to nearly 4,000 troops who had served in the Crimea. Mayor of Dublin presided, supported by Lord-Lieut. Carlisle, Lords Gough, Talbot, and many other gentlemen. Banquet was superior in quality and arrangement to the London Dinner to the Guards.

Edinburgh will give a similar banquet on the 31st.

Mr. John Arrowsmith, Colton, broker, Liverpool, avows himself author of the story in the London Times, of duels and murders in the Georgia Railway cars, and he reiterates the truth of his statements. The affair is incomprehensible here, and excites much curiosity.

The ship Dean Richmond was offered at auction at Liverpool, received price £300, only £2300 bid when she was withdrawn.

Aurelia Saffie, Roman Truinoire, is engaged by the Italian Emancipation Committee, to lecture throughout Britain, to stir up enthusiasm for Italy.

Mrs. Mary T. Stone, sister of Cyrus W. Field, of New York, died at Paris, France, Wednesday 22nd.

FRANCE.—French correspondence gives prominence to the accounts of the Imperial gaities at Compiegne; where the Emperor is enjoying himself by day and fancy balls in the style and costume of Louis the fourteenth by night. Numerous arrests have recently taken place in the department.

Deux Secouds, where a secret society of a dangerous description has been discovered. The Society was organized by tens and hundreds, all trained to obey orders for the destruction of the rich. Sixty persons were apprehended, but the peasants, armed with pitchforks, attacked the escort and rescued the prisoners. New arrests have also been made in the faubourg.

St. ANTONIA.—Within a few days, the report of the Bank of France, is rather more favourable, although the Bank has adopted yet more stringent measures, and will not make any advance at present on Railway shares or rents. Commercial bills, having a day to run, are always objected to, so that virtually the terms is reduced to forty-five days.

SPAIN.—Accounts from Madrid speak of a new ministerial crisis, the object being to throw Narvaez overboard, and restore absolutism. The Marquis of Valuma, head of absolutist party, is spoken of as the coming man, but he in the meantime declines the responsibility. It is said that O'Donnell is not in command of the household guard as a check upon Narvaez. Count Benckendorf, Russian envoy, has had a cordial reception from the Queen. A daughter has been born to the Duchess of Montpensier.

ITALY.—The grand duke of Tuscany, taking alarm at the demonstration against Naples, appears disposed to grant some concession to his people, by reviving with some modification to the constitution of 1841. Paris constitutional asserts as if from some source that in consequence of the negotiations between Austria and Rome, the Austrians are about to withdraw, and will retain only two points.

ANCONA AND BOLOGNA.—A treaty has been concluded between Russia and Naples, placing the ships of the latter in Russian ports on the footing of the most highly favoured nations.

SWITZERLAND.—The Neuchâtel prisoners have been dismissed. The Federal Government is making efforts to be represented in the Congress at Paris.

TURKEY.—The Sultan has sent orders to Reschid Pasha to form a new ministry. Reschid declined on the plea that the questions under deliberation just now would undergo a sudden change. The real cause was a difference of opinion with the French minister respecting the union of the Principality. An attempt had been made to induce Mustapha Pasha to take office but he refused. A treaty had been concluded between France and Belgium providing that no bridge should be sheltered in Belgium as a political offender. Despatch from Constantinople on date, says that Gen. Gayon has died of the Cholera.
