Two railway accidents are recorded; one near Gault, C. W., and another near St. Hyacinthe, C. E.; the former, resulting in three deaths; the latter, in one.

During the last week or two, several severe storms of wind and hail have occurred, by which lives have been sacrificed, and much property destroyed. A station-house on the Great Western Railroad at Larra, C. W. was overturned, on Sabbath week, by which the station master, his wife, and one child lost their lives. The same parts of Vermont and New York were severely visited. At Chateauguay, a village on the Canadian side of the line, only one house escaped without injury; about four hundred houses, and among them, the Roman Catholic Church, being destroyed. One man was killed, and many were wounded; some severely. A tract of country, two miles wide and several long, in a most deso. late condition, with scarcely a tree or fence remaining, speaks to the traveller of Jehovah's "stormy wind, fulfilling his word." Lachute, C. E. sustained cousiderable damage, on Thursday week. Hailstones as big as butter-nuts, killing sheep and fowls, and bruising those who, through fear of being buried beneath their house, had fled into the open air. One of the Lake steamers encountered a whirlwind near Kingston, last Sabbath morning, which nearly laid her on her beam ends. A passenger informed me that the sight

Parliament has been prorogued at last. Among the important measures which have become law during the Session, are, Acts for the relief of the Grand Trunk Railway, to amend the Practice of Law Courts, to give four millions of acres to the North Shore Railway, to give £22,000 per annum to priestly education in Lower Canada, and to make the Legislative Council elective. Among these, the grant to the North Shore Railway is attracting considerable attention. This is a new project for the purpose of connecting Quebec with Lake Huron, through a section of country at present without the advantage of railways. The grant of such an enormous block of land, which is designated with so little precision, that it would be difficult to state its limits, meets with decided opposition. There is reason to fear that a portion of the road of the greatest importance, will never be built; at all events, the reconsideration of some clauses of the Act is

The stand which was taken by the Legistave Council in rejecting the Supply Bill, because it Parliament Buildings at Quebec, is highly satisfactory to the Protestant community. It compelled the Ministry to introduce and hurry through the Lower House, a new Supply Bill, excluding the obnoxious appropriation, which the Upper House accepted, as a matter of course. Quebec is not likely to become the permanent seat of Government. It is by far the worst place that could be selected. The writer would prefer Ottawa, as being central, easy of access, and Protestant, though bordering on Lower Canada.
