BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

(By Telegraph to the News Room.)

The Niagara, which sailed from Liverpool on Saturday, May 24th, with 130 passengers for Boston, arrived at Halifax, at 5 p. m., Wednesday, June 4.

The Fulton sailed from Southampton, on Wednesday, North Star from Cowes, on the 23d, Persia, off Liverpool bar, Friday, 23d, came up river at half-past 4, on the morning of Saturday 24th, Ericson, not telegraphed; Washington carried out advices that Lord Clarendon in Parliament admitted the authority of the correspondence with Nicaragua, seized by Walker, but stated that the matter had come to nothing but a trade sale of muskets, also that the British Government had steadily refused the proposals of the Central American States, to take any active part in their affairs. Washington also took out a report of the Chancellor of the Exchequer's Budget, which merely proposes to retain the Income Tax for two years more. Since Washington sailed there has been but little news.

BRITAIN.—The Bank of England on the 22d had reduced rate of discount for bills for more than sixty days, from 7 to 6 per cent; short bills remaining at 6. Interesting debate in the House of Lords on the motion of Lord Colchester, that Parliament disapproves of the conduct of Plenipotentiaries in congress at Paris, having abandoned without the knowledge or sanction of Parliament the principle inherent in all belligerent powers of capturing goods on board neutral ships.

UNITED STATES.

Mr. Crampton and the British Consuls Dismissed.

WASHINGTON, MAY 28.

Mr. Crampton this evening officially notified of the discontinuance of his diplomatic relations as Minister from Great Britain, near this government, and was furnished with his passports. The Consuls at New York, Philadelphia and Cincinnati were likewise informed, by letter of their dismissal.

The President will also to-morrow transmit to Congress a message, with accompanying documents, relative to Central American affairs, and particularly with regard to the proposition of Great Britain to arbitrate. It is understood that the executive proposes to arbitrate any question of political geography, which, by any possibility, may be raised under the Central American Treaty, but declines any general arbitration as to the construction of the treaty.

Lord Clarendon made an able speech in reply, having reference chiefly to the position of the United States. He quoted Mr. Marcy's letter on the subject, calling it a moderate and dignified letter, and defended the course of the British Plenipotentiaries in giving up a privilege which it was impossible to maintain.

Lord Derby in a strong speech, denounced the abandonment of this privilege as not only humiliating and derogatory, but dangerous to the interests of England. It was favourable to France, who proposed it, and fatal to Britain, that assented. After further debate, the motion was lost by a majority of 54.

Lord John Russell said that next morning he should ask Lord Palmerston a question with the view of ascertaining whether it was the intention of Government to interfere with the war between Nicaragua and the Costa Ricans.

Lord Palmerston incidentally stated the question of Sound duty was still unsettled, but remains under consideration between Britain and Denmark.

The Gazette contains a Board of Trade notice stating that Danish Consuls, in Russian Ports have been instructed to afford the necessary commercial facilities to British subjects until British Consuls can be sent to Russia, also announcing that Cathagena will be deemed a Free Port from the 1st of September next. The British press especially the Times, continues to keep alive the excitement on the Italian question. Lord Lyndhurst has withdrawn his motion, in the House of Lords, lest it might prejudice negotiations now going on with Italian Courts. The London Times thinks the affairs of Central America will compel a combination of Britain and the United States for their adjustment, it also says that Mr. Buchanan's statement that there is nothing to arbitrate, is untenable, and suggests the Emperor of Russia as arbitrator for the United States.

The Trial of Palmer for poisoning his sporting friend, Cook, continues; the defence is closed, and the case now turns mainly upon the medical testimony as to whether or not the symptoms of death accord with the symptoms of poison of strychnine. The most eminent physicians of Britain have given evidence, which seems about equally balanced for and against the prisoner. The case excites extraordinary interest and is valuable as making public that vegetable poisons are readily detected after death.

FRANCE.—Baron Nad has presented credentials as Minister from Austria.

No resident Minister is yet appointed from Russia. Count Orloff performs the duties.

The Emperor has been giving a review and drill to the Princes Maximilian of Austria and Oscar of Sweden.

The Baptism of the Imperial Prince will take place about the middle of June.

The Legislative Session will be extended to witness the event.

M. Thiers, the historian of the Norman Conquest, died at Paris, on the 22nd of May.

SPAIN.—Democrats had brought forward a vote of censure on Government respecting recent troubles at Valencia but was negated by a large majority.

ITALY.—Nothing new on the Italian question.

RUSSIA.—A postal convention has been signed between Russia and United States. Herr Von Rochow is sentenced to five years imprisonment in fortress for recent fatal duel with Minister of police Heukelby.

DENMARK.—The protocol of the Danish proposition to which Russia, Sweden and the Duchy of Oldenburg have given their adhesion is published, dated Copenhagen, May 9th, is a lengthy document, its substance is that Denmark will renounce the Sound and Belt dues for 35,000,000 Rix dollars, all maritime powers must assent. Denmark reserving right to treat separately with the powers not represented in present negotiations.

Compensation named, covers dues both on shipping and cargo. Denmark demands security for the money, and apportion the sum as follows in round numbers. Denmark herself two million and a quarter Rix dollars, Austria two million, Belgium three hundred thousand, Spain one million, France one million and a quarter, Britain ten millions, Norway six hundred and sixty seven thousand, Netherlands one million and a half, Prussia four and a half millions, Russia nine and three quarter millions, Sweden one million and a half, total thirty one and a half millions, leaving a balance of three millions three hundred thousand Rix dollars due by powers not above named; further as there exists at present difference between Denmark and Britain that may delay a settlement Russia offers to keep open her offer on condition of the other powers providing the same.

The east evacuation of the Crimea by French proceeds rapidly, letters to May 10, state that Russia had hanged several Tartars for assassinating allies, some had been sent into exile, and others condemned to work on Roads for life.

Peace has been proclaimed at Tiflis. Capture of Circassian Village of Luneh, and 6,000 Cattle by Russians, is confirmed. Letters from Corfu report Ionian Islands as flourishing, crops of olives good, and currants promising well.

SHIPPING.—Liverpool, May 21st, Oxford and Robert Nassie; Gloucester, 17th, Tasmania; Dundalk, sailed 18th, Christiana. Cleared at Liverpool on the 6th, Earl of Aberdeen, Carthage.

Close of the British Legation.

New York, May 31. (Tribune's Washington correspondent.) It is well ascertained now that Crampton was instructed to close the Legation in the event of dismissal. Hence his abrupt departure yesterday morning. Mr. Lumley, his Secretary of Legation, applied for passports for himself and attaches, and only remains temporarily, as a private individual, to close up the present matters of the Embassy and the Minister. Mr. Crampton notified his servants two weeks ago that they would not be required after the first of June.

The following is the conclusion of Mr. Marcy's letter to Mr. Dallas, concerning the dismissal of Mr. Crampton and Her Majesty's Consuls:

The President has, therefore, been constrained by the consideration of the best interests of both countries, reluctantly to have recourse to the only remaining means of removing, without delay, these very exceptional officers from the connection they now have with this government. This course has been deemed necessary on account of their unfitness for the positions they hold, arising from the very active part they have taken in getting up and carrying out a system of recruiting, which has been attended with numerous infractions of our laws, and which has disturbed our internal tranquility, and endangered our peaceful relations to a nation with which this government is most anxious to maintain cordial friendship and intimate commercial and social intercourse. He has, therefore, determined to send Mr. Crampton, Her Majesty's Diplomatic Representative, his passports, and to revoke the exequaturs of Mr. Matthews, Mr. Barclay, and Mr. Rowcroft, British Consuls at Philadelphia, New York, and Cincinnati.—I am, &c.

The dismissal of Mr. Crampton has caused no sensation at Washington. Mr. Lumley, Secretary of Legation, may remain a charge de interim.

MR. SUMNER'S CONDITION.—Washington, May 31.—Mr. Sumner passed a comfortable night, but is in a very bad condition. It turns out that the scalp was torn from the skull for an inch or two in width beyond the cuts, which was not observed when they were first sewed up. The surface of inflammation and suppuration is thus very extensive and exhibits a malignant and serious wound. Two physicians are in attendance this morning. The greatest care has to be taken to keep the patient quiet. It is likely to be long before he can resume his seat in the Senate. He will be removed from the city as soon as his condition will permit.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Brooks to be expelled.—The Investigating Committee of the House have prepared their report. It gives a synopsis of the evidence taken which covers more than sixty printed pages and concludes with a resolution expelling Brooks and censuring Keitt and Edmundson. The minority report that there has been no breach of privilege, and if there has the House jurisdiction does not cover it.
