The explosion was caused by a deficiency of water in the boilers and heavy fires, producing an excess of steam-a deficiency and an excess of frequent occurrence. The steam guages had been out of order for days, two of them being plugged, and the third having a range bearing no relation to the strength of the boiler. The first engineer had just returned from dinner, procured at a distance from the boat; and during his absence, for more than half an hour, the engine room was locked, and the only working guage inaccessible. The history of the boat from first to last presents a series of misconduct, carelessness, and recklessness of the public safety. One party sailed the boat; the engineers were responsible to another; the Captain, partly to the contractor, partly to the company, having no authority over the engineers, who in their turn had none, for a long time, over the firemen!
