## Correspondence.

### London Correspondence.

LONDON, Nov. 20th, 1857.

A warm, light dash of joy was diffused over these realms when the telegraph sent forward the news of the last Indian mutiny, confirming the capture of Delhi, and announcing the relief of Lucknow, by the troops of General Havelock. The next night (Thursday, 12th) Lady Havelock (as she was justly styled by anticipation) attended, with her two daughters, a musical performance by Julian's band, in honor of her husband's prowess, and though the words had no reference to the Lucknow triumph, the enthusiasm of the audience boiled over when Julian informed them of her presence. Many hearts are trying that she may not have to mourn over the loss of the hero, who, himself, will have been the first to lament the removal of his brave companion-in-arms, General Neill, and his other compeer, the irrepressible Nicholson. The *Morning Star* has been busy trying to excite alarms respecting the safety of the army, whose march on Lucknow, will be remembered along with the devotedness of Leonidas and his three hundred Spartans. But the public have been too happy to be made miserable all at once; they have hope in heaven's grace and Haveock's genius, and, indeed now officially ruled by the sagacious intellect of Outram. The narrow escape of the long cooped up prisoners in the Residency, was in keeping with their wonderful preservation up to the time of their deliverance. Their darkest hour drew on—a few more hours and they would have been laid open to the fangs of the human brutes of prey, and other tortures, and unspeakable atrocities like those at Cawnpore would have been their fate. Providence in mercy—in mercy to the insurgents themselves for the revenge at last would have been bitter and blasting—interposed to prevent a second and greater tragedy;—the sound of artillery is heard—the sign is understood—oh! what hope and love and joy would illuminate eyes that had seemed to lose their lustre for ever!—the minutes appear to well into hours, and hours into days—at length, amidst the heaving rush of the mowers, the heads of the advancing column—the big guns speak in thunder words—the tarian and the scudet are held—and in a few more minutes (how long they seem!) the relievers and the relieved meet amidst tears and half choked cheers. Seldom, on a broad scale, has there been witnessed such a realization of life from the dead. The tension of public interest here is not relaxed, but will be increased by the tidings of the next mail-tidings, which I may observe, will be earlier in reaching us, as the telegraphic wires have been successfully laid down between Cagliari in Sardinia, and Malta. Before another year revives, there will probably be electric communication all the way to India. Our real fear about India lies not in the state of our armies now in the field, but in the provocation made at Calcutta for sending forward this force from England as soon as it arrives. An officer, whose letters from the Crimea were read by the most august person in the land, has sent word to his friends at home, that on the 8th Oct., when he wrote, the Supreme Government had not secured means of transport, either by land or water, for the expected army. 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
