CHINA.

A correspondent of the London "Times" gives the following as the course resolved upon by Lord Elgin—He will proceed with 6 vessels to the mouth of the Pui Ho, near Peking, whence he will transmit to the Emperor a letter, requiring him within a specified time either to recognize or repudiate the acts of his officers at Canton. If he repudiates and makes compensation for the past and gives security for the future, well; if otherwise, Lord Elgin will declare war, occupy Canton, and take further measures to bring the Emperor to terms.

ARRIVAL OF THE PERSIA.

New York, Sept. 15.

The Royal Mail steamer Persia, from Liverpool, arrived at this port at 8 o'clock this morning.

Spanish papers deny the existence of a secret treaty between the United States and Mexico.

It is stated that diplomatic relations with Naples are shortly to be resumed by France and England.

Russian troops are concentrating on the Austrian frontier to prevent interference with the affairs of the Principality.

Advices from Constantinople state that the Porte still insists that England shall evacuate the Isle of Poros, and restore it to Turkey.

The steamer Rip-n has arrived at Southampton from Calcutta, with a number of fugitives from the massacre of Meerut, including the American Missionary, Mr. Hay and family.

The Indian Mutiny.

The Indians arrived at Southampton on Saturday with the heavy portion of the Calcutta and China mails. Seven passengers from India were on board the Indus. They believe it is the determination of the authorities in India to destroy Delhi, and that the great mosque there, which is sacred in the eyes of the Mohammedan population, will be razed to the ground. They confirm the statement that the revolt is a Moslem movement, and that the Hindus have been made a cat's paw by the wily and crafty Mohammedans. They assert that if it were not for the deplorable atrocities committed, the revolt would be to be regretted, as nothing else would have induced the British public to have given attention to Indian affairs. It was well-known to the authorities in India that extensive secret societies had been formed in India, and that the natives communicated with each other by signs and symbols. The authorities thought that these signs and symbols were connected with some peaceful religious movement, and had not the slightest idea that they related to a well-planned and gigantic military insurrection.

The Daily News takes a somewhat gloomy view of the intelligence brought by the last despatches, but point out that amid all that is depressing in the present state of affairs in Hindostan, there may still be discerned hopeful indications: "At Meerut, for instance, the people are extremely dejected, and as humble as possible. The traders tremble before every white face; the agriculturists see that they are ruined; the Mussulmans lose no opportunity of echoing the prayer of the Delhi people that the city may be spared. They see their countrymen hanged by the hallooed every evening at a single station; and they dare not hold communication with each other, for fear of the halloo. It is true the same apprehension—that of the gibbet—renders the mutineers desperate, and they are everywhere ten to one of the British that they are scared by discouragements at every turn. Five of them move upon a single English rifleman, and he kills four in a mysterious manner; by the same sorcery by which the British make the mutineers draw an incredible distance. Nothing deters them more than the Mine. Nay, the old layout, which they themselves use, seems a new weapon in the hands of English soldiers to be

by vengeance. One of our men pins two of theirs to the wall with one thrust, and drives in a foot of the barrel to boot; the barrel comes out twisted like a corkscrew; and the bayonet sticks because it is bent double. At a bridge where guns are deliberately posted, and well worked and loaded, ten of our men to a hundred of theirs take the guns and kill and disperse ten times their own number. Ten men, again, and beat five thousand villagers in the midst of their marauding. The mutineers are not likely to gain courage by learning the cause of the preternatural strength of their foe.

MUTINY AT AURANGABAD.

The following description of the mutiny at Aurangabad, so timely dispersed by the arrival of General Woodburn, would appear to show a want of decision on the part of the General, who has, however, since fallen ill, and his place supplied by Colonel Stuart.

After a severe day's march, the Europeans arrived on the ground unexpectedly. The cavalry bugles were sounded, and men ordered to fall in on foot except their mounted (naive) officers. Abbott then rode past them, and ordered the few men who had remained faithful to fall out of the ranks, leaving the mutineers in a body in front of their lines. The guns of Woodcombe's battery were then ordered to be loaded with canister, and drawn up within thirty yards, and the General with Abbott and the other four of us, rode up to the ranks. Abbott was then ordered to speak to the men, and he did so, asking them their reason for disobeying orders, and for mutinying, reminding them that Government never dreamt of attempting to make them change their religion, and of the punishment which awaited them. The mounted officer, a Jesuit, who commanded this troop, and who was one of the principal instigators of the affair, broke out, "It is not good; it is all false!" Abbott drew his pistol, and would have shot him as he stood, for speaking in rank is equivalent to open mutiny; but the General turned to him and said, "Captain Abbott, I desire that you will not fire on your own men." So Abbott put up his pistol, and went on with his harangue. After another minute the Jesuit broke out again, "It is not true; it is all false. Brothers all, prime and fire!" Upon this, with a clank, out came all their pistols; and had they fired, we six must have fallen, as a revolver, was in my hand in a moment, and as I was next to the Jesuit, I feel confident I could have shot him before he had time to raise his.

But a panic seized them, and they bolted towards their lines, and we rode back behind the guns. Woodcombe had dismounted, and was pointing a gun at them himself; the portfire was lighted, and one word only was wanted to blow every soul of them to the four winds, and thus strike a decisive and terrible blow, which would never have been forgotten; but the word was not given. The General allowed them to get to their houses, and then, as they stood in a group mounting, some two hundred and sixty yards off, Woodcombe ran to another gun, armed and pointed it, and, losing his patience at not being ordered to fire, sang out, "May I fire, Sir?" If any answer was returned, certainly no order was given; and the rasals got to their horses and were up on them and away in a moment. Then came the order to fire just as they were getting under cover of some buildings; some twenty-nine shots were fired at them, but without effect, only killing some few horses and a poor Ghorawalla. The Dragoons were then ordered to charge, as the mutineers had by this time cleared their lines, and were drawn up in a line on a plain to our right, out of shot of the guns. Forward went the 14th at a gallop, and the men of the 1st waited in line till the 14th were fairly near them, and then broke up and each man turned his horse's head and dispersed in every possible direction. The dragoons caught and cut down some half-dozen, and the rest got away. Abbott joined the charge, and his horse being fresh, he managed to get up with one of the mutinous officers, who, seeing no chance of escape, put his sword between his teeth, dropped his reins, and held up his hands in token of submission, and as a sign for quarter. Abbott lowered his sword, and the brute, as he passed him, drew his pistol and fired it straight at his face. A motion of the horse saved him, and he drew his pistol and fired two shots at the ruffian, but missed him. He was caught later in the day, and hung next morning before all the troops. After the charge, the rest of the native cavalry were brought out, and those suspected were disarmed and placed in confinement, to wait their trial by drumhead court-martial. Towards the evening nearly seventy of those who had escaped were taken or given up, and this reduced the number of those who have actually got away to about fifty-five. The Jesuit who had first drawn his pistol was missing altogether, and no tidings could be got of him, though the General was most anxious to secure him. Had the guns opened upon the rasals directly they drew their fire-arms, not one could have escaped, and a blow direct and decisive would have been struck, and the mutiny in all probability quelled, in these parts at all events. All were disappointed at the result, and particularly as the General had them so entirely at his mercy."
