The Ministerial Office.

The work and end of the Christian ministry is one of the greatest importance. An inspired apostle exclaimed : "Who is sufficient for these things ?" An angel, we think, might well tremble in view of its responsibilities. A Christian writer has well said that, "it is identical with the mediation of Christ." He, then, who stands as a messenger from God to men in relation to e saivation of souls, must be in direct fellowsnip with Christ. The design of the cross and pulpit is the same, the redemption of the world ; and hence the oneness which should exist between Christ and the minister. This being the ase, we ask, what are some of the important qualifications necessary to so sacred an office. and so great a work?

The first of these is, we apprehend a special call thereunto. By a special call we do not mean a mere impulse to "go and preach ;" but an all-constraining and continual drawing out. after the promotion of God's glory, and the salvation of souls. Paul's reasons assigned for preaching the Gospel, are the legitimate reasons of every real servant of Jesus-"THE LOVE OF URIST CONSTRAINETH US." He who is not constrained by this love to " seek the wandering souls of men," has yet to receive authority from God for the work. Preparatory to this call there must be, in the individual, a deep, in-wrought principle of holmess-an abhorrence of all sin. Those to whom God assigns the work and care of the sanctuary must be pure-not only in word and act, but also in motives. He who can sin a lit'le with impunity, may rest assured that God liness must precede, and go with eminent use-

A second qualification for the ministry is the necessary gifts for the work. No preach the Gospel of Christ, a man needs the gift of utterance, with some system of communication that will render him intelligible. A verbosity of language without proper arrangement does not constitute a ministerial qualification. The gift of utterance is one that requires much culti
