There was a great debate the other evening ! on the Danubian Principalities, Wallachi and Moldavia. These Provinces have never been united, but some parties are anxious for a union, to develope, they say, their common resources and to make them a great christain State. But others see in this proposal a means of Russian ascendancy and the revival of that danger to Turkey which the war of 1853 was undertaken to avert. Mr. Gladstore moved, and Lord John Russell supported an address to the Queen, virtually binding our Ambassador at the ensuing Paris Conference to maintain the former view; but the House dissented by a vote of 292 to 114 vo'es.
