

There was a great debate the other evening on the Danubian Principalities, Wallachia and Moldavia. These provinces have never been united, but some parties are anxious for a union, to develop, they say, their common resources and to make them a great Christian State. But others see in this proposal a means of Russian ascendancy and the revival of that danger to Turkey which Mr. Gladstone moved, and Lord John Russell supported an address to the Queen, virtually binding our Ambassador at the ensuing Paris Conference to maintain the former view; but after speeches from Palmerston and Disraeli, the House dissented by a vote of 292 to 114 votes.

SOCIAL AFFAIRS.

Social affairs are not much ruffled, except by the announcement, alas! too frequent, of murders, manslaugthers, and other terrible criminal offences. Cases of severe disease are also common.

The Dean of York, (Sir W. Cockbourn), and Sir J. Dodson (late Judge of the Prerogative Ecclesiastical Court), have died; and on Tuesday the editor of the *United Service Gazette* was accidentally killed. Mr. Roebuck was compelled to stop speaking, by the other night in the House, and leave by sudden indisposition. He is a little better.

Mr. Dickens is reading his Christmas Tales at St. Martin's Hall, to large audiences, who pay for admission. Mr. Albert Smith is reported to be on the eve of shutting up his Mount Blanc Exhibition, and going to China in search of a new subject.

Mr. Russell's letters in the *Times*, describing the siege and fall of Lucknow, are probably the most widely read productions of the day; and very remarkable they are. A telegram is expected to-morrow or Sunday with more news—for which we are still impatient.

A statue of Dr. Jenner has been erected in Trafalgar Square, near to Sir C. Napier's, on the right hand side of Nelson's monument. On the left side Haydock's is to stand.

The library of the Rev. W. Jay has been sold at good prices; and the "Memoir of and Revisions of Rev. W. A. Vaughan" who was for some time Mr. Jay's assistant, is one of the most popular books of the season.

Mr. Gough's action against Dr. Lees has taken a civil form, and will proceed in the Court of Exchequer.

Next week the Band of Hope Union hold a series of meetings and entertainments, and the National Temperance League has a sermon on Sunday evening, the 9th, by Rev. A. Wallace, of Edinburgh, in St. Martin's Hall, and the annual meeting in Exeter Hall on Tuesday, E. Salisbury, Esq., in the chair.

Four Days Later from Europe.

Arrival of City of Washington.

New York, May 23.—Steamship City of Washington, from Liverpool, 10 A. M. May 12, arrived at this port this evening. The Cunard steamship Africa, from New York, arrived at Liverpool at 1.30 P. M. on Sunday, 9th inst.

The news by this arrival is interesting, a ministerial crisis in England being regarded as imminent.

A resolution had been proposed in the House of Commons by Mr. Cardwell, and in the House of Lords by Earl Shaftesbury, censuring government for the publication of their dispatch to the governor general of India, in regard to his proclamation to the people of Oude. Ellenborough assumed all the responsibility and resigned. His resignation was accepted.

The resolution was to be considered the day after the sailing of the City of Washington.

Speculators were rife as to whether the Ministry would resign or dissolve parliament, in the event of the passage of the resolution. Calcutta dates are of April 9. The news is unimportant.

A hot-weather campaign in Rohilund is inevitable.

All was quiet in China.

The second election in the fifth constituency, Paris, resulted in the success of the opposition candidate.

The Paris Conference has been further postponed a few days.

M. Dix, the Spanish Minister of the interior, has resigned.

GREAT BRITAIN.

On the 10th, in the Lords, Earl of Shaftesbury gave notice that, on the 14th, he should move a resolution condemning the government in publishing their despatch to the Governor General of India.

In the Commons, Mr. Cardwell gave notice that on the 12th inst, he should move the following resolution:—Resolved, That this House, whilst it abstains from expressing any opinion upon the policy of any proclamation issued by the Governor General of India, in relation to Oude, has seen, with regret and serious apprehension that her Majesty's government has addressed to the Governor General of India, through the secret committee of India house, a dispatch commending in strong terms the conduct of the Governor General of India; and that they are of opinion such a course on the part of government must tend, under the present circumstances of India to produce a most prejudicial effect, by weakening the authority of the Governor General, and by encouraging further resistance on the part of those who are still in arms against us.

After sundry votes upon the army estimates, a resolution was moved by Lord Stanley, and agreed to, authorising government to guarantee £100,000 at a rate of interest not exceeding 4 per cent, for the use of Prince Edward's Island.

On the 11th, in the House of Lords, Earl of Ellenborough explained the circumstances under which the despatch censuring Lord Cardwell had been written; admitted that he alone was responsible for it, and announced

that, rather than expose his colleagues to the censure of Parliament, he had tendered his resignation as President of the board of control to her Majesty, and the same had been accepted.

Lord Derby said the resignation had been accepted with regret, but admitted that he considered the publication of the dispatch premature and injudicious.

Lord Shaftesbury explained the terms of his motion of censure against the government, which, in effect, takes the same ground as that proposed in the House of Commons, and bases the complaint on the supposition that government acted in the matter without a full knowledge of the proceedings of Lord Cardwell.

Sir Henry Bulwer, formerly minister at Washington, is gazetted as successor of Lord Stratford de Redcliffe at Constantinople. All the wire of the Atlantic telegraph cable had been taken out of the tanks at Keyham, and coiled on board the Niagara and Agamemnon, so that nothing remained to be done but to take on board a small portion of the new cable, which was being done, and the paying out machinery. The departure of the ships on the experiment cruise was expected to take place on the 25th of May.

The mail steamer Canada, from Africa for Plymouth, sunk on the 4th of May, after being in collision with the bark Eliza, both from Cardiff for Batavia. The captain, two passengers and four seamen were drowned. The rest, numbering about fifty persons, were saved by the bark.

A serious accident had occurred on the Trent Valley Railroad, entailing the loss of three lives, and serious injury to four other persons.

INDIA.

The Calcutta mails of April 9 arrived at Suez on the 4th of May. The news is of no special importance.

Lucknow was perfectly tranquil, and not a single armed man was to be seen.

The 4th Bengal Light Cavalry, 160 strong, had been brought to a court martial at Umballah. Sixty were sentenced to be hanged, and the remainder to be transported for life.

A strong force had been marched for Bareilly.

Col. Seaton's force had encountered and beaten the rebels, taking three guns.

Another dispatch from Malva says Rohilund was in possession of the rebels, who were said to be 100,000 strong.

An amnesty was offered in Oude to all who returned to their allegiance, mutineers excepted.

Sir Colin Campbell had issued a general order of the army.

CHINA.

The dates from Hong Kong are to March 20. All continued quiet in China.

Lord Elgin had reached Ningpo, and Admiral Seymour had left Hong Kong for it, it is supposed, Shanghai.

FRANCE.

The accounts from the agricultural districts of France are cheering. The wheat crops promise an early and abundant harvest. The vineyards generally present a fine appearance notwithstanding damage from frosts and disease in some sections.

VERY LATEST.

[By Telegraph to Liverpool.]

LONDON, May 12.—The Times city article says: "The funds have showed some uneasiness to-day. No doubt seems to be entertained that the proposed vote of censure on the Government will be adopted in the House of Commons, on Thursday, and although it seems almost incredible that a dissolution will either be contemplated or allowed, the existence of doubt upon the point exercises a very unfavorable influence.

"The rate of insurance on the steamer Stamboul, which has now been 118 days from Melbourne, with 4800 pounds of gold, has now advanced to 60 per cent. at Lloyd's. This vessel was spoken at sea about a month after leaving Melbourne, but has not been heard of since."

LIVERPOOL BREADSTUFFS MARKET, May 14.—Messrs. Richardson, Spence & Co. report the Grain trade dull, under the influence of fine seasonable weather.

Flour is neglected, but nominally unchanged—Philadelphia and Baltimore 22s a 22s 6d; Western Canal 21s a 21s 6d; Ohio (via north) 22s 6d a 23s 6d (via New Orleans) 23s a 24s. Wheat quiet but steady; white 7s a 7s 6d, Corn—Prime white held for 36s; yellow in moderate request at 34s 9d a 35s.

LONDON MONEY MARKET.—The Stock Exchange had been depressed under the impression that another ministerial crisis was at hand, and the continued withdrawals of gold for the continent. There was no alteration in the value of or demand for money.

Dr. Bernard Trial.

The following truthful and eloquent extracts from the speech of Mr. Edwin James, Attorney for Dr. Bernard, in his trial for complicity in the conspiracy against the life of Louis Napoleon, will be found interesting:

"Louis Napoleon had been an exile in Switzerland, which country they would remember had refused to give him up, notwithstanding the threats of Louis Philippe; he had been exiled in America, and then he sought a refuge on the shores of England; and from the banks of the Rhine and the constitutional shores of England he had induced the enlightened people of France to confide their political destinies in his hands. Placed at the head of a constitutional government, he swore to maintain inviolate the freedom of France, and before the oath was cold on his lips he violated it. (Cheers, which were immediately suppressed.) His learned friend the Attorney General had tried to enlist his feelings by talking of 516 wounds which were inflicted on the bystanders on the 14th of January; but let him call their attention to the 2d of December, 1851. Talk of wounds! Why, on the 2d of December, 1851, the drunken French soldiers were turned loose upon an unresisting mob, and men, women, and children were indiscriminately slaughtered. Louis Napoleon had determined that he would not govern constitutionally any longer. There were men in Paris then

who were more attached to order than himself, for they had never been guilty of treasonable practices against the existing Government. There was Cavaignac, than whom no man ever to maintain order in France, and then whom a greater patriot and a greater lover of constitutional freedom never lived; and there were Changarnier and Thiers, and Lamoriciere and Bedeau, who were lovers of order, but who were equally lovers of constitutional government. On the 2d of December, 1851, Louis Napoleon, by whom, he trusted he had shown them, this prosecution was instituted, without reason, caused the members of the representative assembly to be seized in their beds, and confined in goal. Without cause and without reason his drunken soldiery broke into the Court of Cassation, where the judges of the court were sitting, and where an accusation of treason was being made against him, and these soldiery turned the judges into the streets. He erected himself a throne, and then went through the mockery of an election. Upon that occasion, and he was speaking from history well-known, from able letters from Paris, which were published in the journals, thousands of persons were sent to goal without trial, and transported to the arid plains of Algeria, or to the deadly marshes of Cayenne. Such had been the conduct of the man who was the persecutor in this case, and they were asked to convict this prisoner under some absurd and ridiculous threats that we were to have a war if he was not executed."

Mr. James concluded his address with an appeal to the jury in these terms: "I believe that as regards the law this trial is a mockery and a sham. The great object of the French Government is to establish the principle that the French exile is not protected in this country. It has been the pride of Englishmen that this country is the refuge of all. As Cicero says, 'Regum, populum, nationum portus et refugium.' We have had exiled kings here; we have had exiled priests and exiled nobles. We have had monarchs in France in exile here; and Louis Napoleon himself was an exile here. The object of this prosecution is to make this country no longer the asylum of the exile; but I trust you will hesitate long before you verdict you bring about such a result. I trust that you will find in this case doubts which will justify, may compel you, to say that the particular crime which is charged is not proved to your satisfaction. It has been a great advantage to this country that it has ever been open to political exiles. The inquisition, the persecutions of Philip, and the revocation of the edict of Nantes, sent to our shores many who enriched us by their knowledge of manufactures and arts, and from these refugees some of our best citizens, amongst whom I may mention the Laboucheres and the Romillys, have sprung. Will you destroy that asylum which exiles have ever enjoyed, and which I trust they will ever continue to enjoy? No, gentlemen, you will not. I implore you to pause, because I believe that at present you do not see the political results of your verdict. Gentlemen, I have done. I have discharged my duty in regard to this unhappy gentleman to the best of my ability. I have discharged it as an English advocate, and I trust that I have discharged it fearlessly, and so I should in an English court of justice. And I am proud to say, that though the liberty of the press is extinguished in France—though a man cannot there record his opinion, if it is unfavorable to the Imperial Government—I am glad that it is the pride of the French that freedom of speech still lingers there, and that the tyrant cannot destroy it. I have discharged my duty to the best of my ability, little equal to the magnitude of the case. Let me urge you to discharge yours fearlessly, conscientiously, and firmly. You will have the case left in your hands, after the reply of the Attorney-General, by one who will hold the scales impartially. Let me implore you to discharge your duty unimpaired by the French army and by threats of French invasion. Tell the French Emperor that he cannot intimidate an English jury. Tell him that the jury-box is the sanctuary of English liberty. Tell him that on this spot your predecessors have resisted the power of the crown, backed by the influence of crown-servants and time-serving judges. Tell him that under every difficulty and danger your predecessors have secured the political liberties of the people. Tell him that the verdicts of English juries are founded on the eternal and immutable principles of justice. Tell him that panoplied in that armour, no threat of armament or invasion can intimidate you. Tell him that though 600,000 French bayonets glittered before you, though the roar of French cannon thundered in your ears, you will return a verdict which you own hearts and consciences will sanctify and approve, careless whether that verdict please or shakes a despotic foreign despot, or secures or shakes a despotic foreign despot, or secures or shakes a despotic foreign despot, or secures or shakes a despotic foreign despot."
