19-Government cannot long be maintained by any force in a country where people is rendered hostile by a sense of wrong and if it were possible so to maintain it, it would not be a consummation to be desired.

This dispatch was forwarded to Lord Canning by Lord Ellenborough without shewing it to his Colleagues: had he consulted them it would of course been modified. The nature of this document becoming known, an organized opposition to the Government upon it, was planned, and to save the Ministry Lord Ellenborough, assumed, as he should, the whole weight of the despatch, relieved his colleagues and tendered to Her Majesty his resignation without even informing Earl Derby of his intentions. The motions brought forward against the Ministry were by Lord Shaftesbury in the Lords, and Mr. Cardwell in Commons. The debate in the Commons was continued for several days, and was terminated by Mr. Cardwell at the solicitation of several Liberal members withdrawing his resolution, thus saving the Ministry a defeat. In the Lords they were sustained by a majority of nine.
