It is stated that the tenor of Lord Napier's ispatches is to instruct Admiral Stewart as to the attitude of the United States Government and people with reference to the alleged outrages and to inform him of the steps that have been taken in accordance therewith.

Совоина, 4th June, 1859. Case of Dr. Ryerson.

MR. EDITOR; -Your Canada Cor:esponden has had cause, in his judgment, to comment up on the many cases of fraud which have come before the public. Every additional instance has been taken as further proof of the low state of morals in this country. Unquestionably a higher tone of piety and more correct opinion respecting moral obligations would beget a bet ter state of things. When we see the Prime Minister of a country justifying himself in taking advantage of his official position to increase his wealth, we may expect officials of a lower grade to copy his example; and Canadian history illustrates this natural sequence most faithfully. We have had Bowes, then Mayor of Toronto, and a host of others, turning into their own pockets public money by virtue of their official position, in imitation of the Hon. Francis Hincks. The public has been repeatedly startled by fresh revelations, implicating men of the first respectability, but was scarcely prepared for the instance about to be named. A charge was recently made against the Rev. Dr. Ryerson, the Superintendant of Schools in Canada West, that he had appropriated to his own use £1,500 the interest of certain monies passing through his hands, and deposited in the Bank of Upper Cana. da. Knowing the political bias of the journal in which the charge was first publicly made, and aware that the Rev. Superintendent had given that journal offence by his views on the Separate Schools question, it was thought advisable to await the Doctor's explanations before pronouncing him guilty. These explanations have been made public, and only confirm the truth of the charge. Dr. Ryerson does not pretend to deny that he has appropriated £1,500 interest, but defends his course, substantially on the following grounds :-- 1. That the law does not require him to disburse the money,-2. That he acted as Treasurer and paymaster of more than £200,000 without compensation, when his salary was only £500 per annum, -a smaller sum than is allowof to senior clerks in some of the public departments, 3. That he had no instruction where to keep the monies committed to his care and that for his own convenience he deposited them in the Bank. Any interests paid upon such deposits being matter of private arrangement between the depositor, and the Bank, belongs of right to

Whether the public will agree with the Dr's inference or not remains to be seen. The Treasurer of a society, the holder of any money on trust, might reason in the same way. It seems but common honesty that the profits arising from all such monies should go to the credit of the owner, not the Trustee or the Treasurer. Wherein, as to principle, consists the difference be-tween a Treasurer of a county speculating on the funds on hand, and the case under consideration? Dr. Ryerson expresses his astonishment at being called upon to refund. He had been doing duty not prescribed by law without remuneration. This he regards as unreasonable, and says he is now compelled to ask for remuneration for services which he should never have named but for the attempts to wrest from him a casual advantage granted and withdrawn at the pleasure of the Bank. Why did he not refuse to do the extra work, or have a distinct understanding that "the casual advantage"-a pretty good one, in this case, at any rate-should be his remuneration? Surely this is not in accordance with that simple honesty which we have a right to expect in a Christian and in a minister of the Gospel! The second reason given is most unworthy. It is the plea of the clerk who abstracts money from his master's till, or pilfers his master's goods, or sells at an advance upon the price asked, pocket ng the difference. It is the plea of almost all fraudaent persons, and seems strange indeed coming from one holding a position so honorable- The reputation of the Doctor cannot but suffer among the straight-forward and upright, as it is even now made the sport of his political and ecclesias-
