First Melted, then Molded.

Lessons of vast profit may sometimes be found in the mechanical, as in the natural world, by studying which, we may grow wiser and better. " First melted, then molded," broke from our lips, not long since, in an iron foundry, while watching the workman preparing for a "cast."

The roar of the bellows and the crackling of the fire were almost deafening; the men were busy, preparing ladles to receive the melted metal; glitering sparks of blazing iron were flying from some uncovered orifice, in the "cupola," and all was activity and atchfulness.

We had scarcely taken a position of some security from the said sparks, when one of the men, into whose head an economical thought seems to have broken, seized a shovel, and commenced scraping up fragments of cindery iron scraps, and small pieces, knocked from castings.
