Orsini accepted the full responsibility of the part he had taken in the affair; confessed he wanted to kill the Emperor, and was ready to die; he never confided his intention to Mr. Allsop; said M. Bernard brought the bombs to Brussel, but did not know for what purpose they were intended; he would not say anything as to the other prisoners. Pierri denied all participation in the conspiracy until the day the attempt was made, and then repented. Mr. Taylor, of Birmingham, maker of bombs, did not answer to his name.

Paris, Friday .- The Jury has given a verdict of guity as regards four of the accused. The Court pronounced sentence of death on Osini, Rudio and Pierri.
