We ask is not this a legal ourrage on the morals of the community To these dens of vice the degraded and vicious repair; there they riot in their iniquity, and become nerved for acts of violence and bloodshed. The fact of such places being found within our city licensed to sell liquor, is a foul disgrace to those who have charge of the public peace. Is the pultry sum from these places of infamy? Is it the peace stand forth and answer.

To license men to promote riot and disturbance, and then to send out armed police. men to preserve the peace, will not be unlikely to result in tragedies similar to rhe recent one at York Point. To prevent the repetition of such acts, greater care must be taken on the part of the authorities, not to cover with legal authority the existence of gambling houses, and brothels; and to ferret out and destroy every similar place that exists without the authority of license.
