

Revenue.

Descending from man to money, the year's revenue has been rather above, seventy millions, and the expenditure nearly equal, but leaving a few thousands to go to the expenditure of the national debt. The last Gilbert & Beckett jocosely advised that the readiest way of doing this would be for the sovereign to file a petition of insolvency in the name of the nation, and take the benefit of the Act. "In that case made and provided."

Execution, &c.

We have had a public execution at Newgate since my last, and another execution arrested. This latter case is very interesting in a legal point of view. The prisoner was convicted of murder by a jury, one member of which was not the proper man. All the judges had to give their opinion whether this error vitiated the verdict, a majority of two, I think, decided that it did not; but it is now said that the Home Secretary (Miles Gray) has suspended the execution, as the judicial opinions are so nearly balanced. Most likely the prisoner will be transported for life. I do not suppose that the Government have the right under the circumstances to order a new trial.

Clerical Assault.

One remarkable case of assault has just been published—the assaulters being a clerical pastor of an academy and his wife, the latter of whom exchanged a former lover from London into Yate Common, in Bristol, where he was almost murdered by her husband. The motive is not stated—though the inducement held out to the gentlemen to go down was, that the lady was a widow and wished to renew the former acquaintance.

Items.

Commencement efforts are making in several counties to revise or abolish the hiring "statute"—an arrangement by which young men and women at specified times meet to be hired as farm or domestic servants. As now conducted the statute is a cause of great corruption. The North Western and Great Northern Railway Companies have been for a number of weeks carrying on a war of cheap fares to Manchester and other northern towns. After inflicting mental injuries they have come to an agreement on the matters of dispute to the chagrin of the many passengers who were enjoying the savings of ridiculously low rates of transit. At last the Ditcher Demosion case is decided by the Supreme Court, the Privy Council, and the Tractarian Archdeacon escapes the deprivation to which he was sentenced by the Archbishop of Canterbury. Thanks to the law's delays, his opponent is declared to have begun the suit long after the date of the offence alleged; and the world is no wiser on the point whether a Tractarian can be legally considered an orthodox Churchman. Each side pays its own costs.

Extra Religious Services.

Westminster Abbey and Exeter Hall receive each their multitudes of visitors on Sunday evening; but an extraordinary rival has arisen in the Albion Palace (late the Panopticon) in Leicester Square, the proprietor of which is Mr. E. T. Smith, lessee of Drury Lane Theatre. He persuaded Rev. J. H. Rutherford, a revivalist preacher, belonging to the Evangelical Union of Scotland, to preach twice a day each Sunday during February, and forthwith issued a programme, stating that the morning service would be free but that in the evening service there would be a grand display of sacred things, the price to be one shilling for admission. Mr. Rutherford has relinquished his connection with the scheme, and Mr. Smith has to look for a successor. Mr. S. is a publican, as well as lessee of a theatre, and intends applying for a license to sell drink at the Albion Palace. This audacious mercenary proceeding is universally condemned, and if it leaves Mr. S. some thousands of pounds poorer, he will have to pity him. He outbarnums Barnum, and deserves a reward which may leave a lesson behind it. He is another proof how Christians are excelled by worldly men in the resolution they display to bring their plans to pass. The holiest of causes should have the wisest and most indomitable of friends. May we seek to be numbered among them.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

(By Telegraph to the News Room)

THURSDAY, Feb. 25. Several Bills received a third reading in the House this morning. A motion was adopted to the effect that the House should resolve itself into Committee of Supply on Monday. House resolved itself into Committee of the whole and passed a Bill to enable the Trustees of Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy to establish a College. Mr. Connell gave notice of his intention to move an Address to His Excellency, asking number of graduates at King's College for the last six years. Mr. McAdam introduced a Bill to increase representation of the County of Charlotte. On motion of Mr. Connell the College Bill was fixed as the order of the day for Monday. Hon. Provincial Secretary laid before the House the estimates for the current year, with statement of the liabilities and assets of the Province, embracing full account of expenditures on Public Works, and statement of the sums to be voted for the public service. Speech of Secretary in explanation of items in budget occupied nearly two hours. Mr. Chandler presented a petition of W. R. M. Harris and 95 others, praying an amendment in the Act relating to assessment of Railway Land Damages. House adjourned at 5.

FRIDAY, Feb. 26. The House was occupied this morning principally in transacting routine business. The following Bills passed in Committee:—The Bill to amend the Act relating to the public debt of the City of St. John. The Bill to incorporate the St. Andrews Mechanics' Institute. The Bills to alter the time of holding the Circuit Court in the Counties of Albert, Westmorland and Charlotte.

Read a first time, a Bill to enable the Corporation of the City of St. John to effect certain repairs on the streets of the said City.

The Bill to incorporate the Synod of the Presbyterian Church was again taken up, and gave rise to another round of speeches. The Bill was finally carried by a vote of 20 to 12.

Mr. McIntosh presented a petition from nearly 500 inhabitants of Fredericton praying that no act may pass for the establishment of a Police force in that City.

Mr. Desbrisay moved an address asking for a copy of the correspondence with the Nova Scotia Government on the subject of a Trunk Railway to the border of that Province.

Mr. Tibbits applied for leave of absence for a few days.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 27th 1858.

House opened pro forma at 10 o'clock. The bill to incorporate the Synod of the Presbyterian Church passed a third reading without opposition, and was sent to the Legislative Council.

Considerable discussion took place on a motion made by the Attorney General that consideration of the College Bill be deferred for some days, it having been previously decided to take the Bill up as the order of the day on Tuesday. Objections were offered by Mitchell, Steadman, and others, on the grounds that the Government ought to deal with the question. It was urged by others that if the Government wished to bring in a comprehensive Educational Scheme the motion should pass.

Mr. Connell moved that the Bill be taken up as the order of the day on Wednesday. This motion was carried.

In the debate which occurred on this subject a belief was expressed by some of the members that the Session would terminate on the 25th of March.

Mr. McLeish presented a petition from Rev. Henry B. Nichols, on behalf of himself and others, praying that the Bill before the House relative to Canterbury Street, may not pass.

Hon. Mr. Tilley presented a petition from Wm. Olive, John C. Littlehale, and 230 others, praying that the bill may pass incorporating certain persons having in contemplation the construction of a Wire Suspension Bridge across the St. John River at Navy Island.

The House resolved itself into Committee of the whole and passed a Bill in amendment of the Carleton Water Works Act.

Mr. McPhelin gave notice of his intention to move a resolution to the effect that all heads of department, being barristers at law or attorneys, shall not hereafter be allowed to practice in the profession or receive fees for professional service, excepting the officers of Attorney General and Solicitor General. House adjourned at half past three.

FREDERICTON, March 1.

Several members were absent in the forenoon. Mr. Steadman presented a petition from several inhabitants of Moncton, praying for a division of that Parish.

Mr. Gilbert gave notice of motion for an Address on the subject of the non-expenditure of money by the government in connection with Grimross Neck.

A motion to go into consideration of Supplies for the Public Service met with opposition from Mr. Gray and others, but finally prevailed. The House then went into Committee of Supply, Mr. Steadman in the chair.

An animated debate took place on the motion to pass the usual amount for the collection and protection of the Revenue. The debate lasted until four o'clock and the question was then taken whether Supply should be proceeded with, which was carried in the affirmative by a considerable majority.

The sums for Great Road service and several other amounts passed, when progress was reported.

Mr. McIntosh enquired of the Government whether it was their intention to proceed with the construction of the Railway extensions named in the present act, or whether they designed to submit a measure with the view of cutting off any or all the extensions. The Attorney General replied that an answer would be given in a few days.

FREDERICTON, March 2.

After transaction of preliminary business in the House to day, Mr. Gilbert gave notice of motion for an Address to His Excellency asking for a list of all appointments in Queen's County since July last, date of such appointments, and the cause why certain officers have been removed.

House resolved itself into Committee of the Whole in consideration of a Bill to incorporate the Presbyterian Church of New Brunswick. Some sections of the Bill met with much opposition, and it was decided to report progress.

Friday was set apart to go into consideration of the Bill to make the Legislative Council elective.

House engaged in supply nearly all P. M. Usual grants for educational purposes passed without much discussion.

On motion to pass usual grant for Provincial Penitentiary a long debate followed. Several members contended that the House should have further information, in shape of reports, etc., before passing grant. Others complained that the institution benefited only the City of St. John. Finally progress was reported. Supply to be resumed to-morrow.

Mr. Chandler introduced a Bill to amend the act relative to land required for Railway purposes.

House adjourned at a quarter past five.

WEDNESDAY, March 3.

The House made no further progress with supply this morning, and decided to resume on Friday.

Mr. Wright gave notice of his intention to move an address asking for a list of the monies in the hands of Deputy Treasurers at the end of the fiscal year.

Mr. Cudlip's bill relating to co-partnership, passed in committee. Mr. Watters presented a petition from several merchants of St. John, praying that a bill before the House, relating to weighing of coal, may not pass. The Committee appointed to try matters connected with the Northumberland contested election met this morning, but in conse-

quence of the absence of James Tibbits, Esq., Mr. Sutton's nominee, the committee obtained leave to adjourn over until Friday.

The Bill to abolish the grant to King's College was taken up in the Afternoon, Hon. Mr. Watters in the Committee.

Mr. Connell, the mover of the Bill made a lengthy speech in its support, urging the importance of prompt action, and the abolition of all the annual expenditure for the support of the College as the only remedy that should be adopted.

Hon. Mr. Brown followed tracing the history of the various attempts made by the Legislature to make the College useful and expressing a doubt whether the Bill now before the House would have the desired effect.

Considerable discussion then took place, it being urged as the Attorney General was absent, progress should be reported, and a motion to this effect was carried with the understanding that consideration of the Bill be resumed to-morrow.

During the discussion the Hon. Mr. Smith stated that the Education Bill of the Government would apply to parish schools only.

Another long discussion took place on Mr. Cudlip's Usury Law Bill which was finally postponed for three months.

Several other matters were also disposed of. The House is driving business through at railroad speed. It is stated that the prorogation is fixed for Thursday, March 25th.

We learn by the Church Witness that a Petition to the Lieutenant Governor has been signed by nearly all the Magistrates and merchants in the City, setting forth the disapproval of the Lord's Day by the delivery of letters from the Post Office on Sunday; and praying that this practice may be abolished. The Post Office department is under the control of the Executive, and it is to be really hoped that the prayer of the Petition will be granted. The Witness in an editorial on the subject says:

"It appears that a delivery of letters takes place every Sunday afternoon; and to effect this, the attendance of two, and frequently three, of the employees is required. They are called away from the special duties of the sacred day of rest, to perform their ordinary avocations. But the mischief does not end here. A number of persons are induced by various motives to attend at the office, and thus it happens that a crowd of both young and old may be seen congregated together on the Lord's Day. When a young man sees his employer indifferent to the obligations of the Sabbath, he soon follows his example, and from one step to the other, becomes an open violator of the laws of God and man. Sabbath-breaking is the first step in the downward road to ruin, as thousands of unhappy youths have testified; and surely, therefore, every one should lend his influence to put a stop to a practice which has a direct tendency to lead to it."

We hear that it is thought in Fredericton that the House will complete its Session by the 25th inst.

Ex Deputy Sheriff James Sayre of Dorchester was so severely frozen a few nights since in returning from his brother's to his own residence on Dorchester Island, that he expired soon after being discovered.

The whole debt of the Province, funded and unfunded, is stated by the Provincial Secretary to be, \$512,931 12s. 6d. Since the 1st of November \$75,000 had been expended on Railways, \$8,000 of which were for Land Damages, \$10,000 for iron, \$6,000 for locomotive and wheels, and the remaining very large balance (\$51,000) had been spent in labor in the counties of St. John, King's and Westmorland. The credit of the Province stands high in the mother country.

The meeting is spoken of as one of the best Bible Meetings held in this City for years. —Reporter.

NEW ORLEANS.—An editorial article in the Delta of 26th ult., asserts that the South has already opened the African slave trade, and that a regular depot has been established on Pearl river, in Mississippi, where cargoes have been received, the negroes sold and put to work. The Delta says the vessels engaged in the trade generally use the French flag, because the British cruisers on the African coast will not trouble it.
