Whether they will now consent, or what will be done I cannot say. Both Mr. Lecs and Mr. Gough are men of great influence in the temperance world, and these dissensions are fraught with evil. Mr. Gough's absura note about the Maine Law being a dead letter in the United States damaged him with the friends of prohibition here, and led to much party bickering, which I fear will not now be easily suppressed. In other respects, the temperance movement is worthy of the name as indicating progress and not stagnation. May the wisdom which is profitable to direct, accompany the zeal

The Montreal Witness, apparently out of patience with existing things, says : "It the present parliament would pass an Act for the registration of votes, and an Act to punish severely all fraud and violence at elections, and then ask the Governor General to dissolve the House, that the country may have an opportunity to choose other representatives, we might expect honest, upright Legislation." I fear that even supposing these things done, we should find dishonest legislators assembled such numbers that upright Legislation would be among things desirable rather than things enjoyed, mercies to be prayed for rather than mercies for which we should fee! impelled to return thanks. Good laws are valuable; but we need something behind them and below the:n. I apprehended that our Canadian Legislation is offersive to the honest, in great measure because it is the reflection of the active electing powers that be; that it we had more sturdy uprightness among us as a people we should be b'essed with more efficient government. idea of our financial condition. Balance sheets are not always designed to do this, but sometimes serve to mystify effectually. Our revenue in 1857 exceeded two millions and a half pounds, by about twenty thousand, -a pretty handsome revenue; but the expenditure has been eighty-five thousand pounds in excess of the receipts, We have a public debt of nearly five and a half milliors; with responsibilities in the form of Railway and principal Loan Funds swelling the amount to a total of about thirteen millions of pounds. There is a handsome figure for you! Young Canada with a debt of thirteen millions. Hurrah for Canada! Our agricultural encouragement has cost us £22,-000. (I give round numbers) Our Hospitals and charties £46,000; Geological surveys, £6,500; Mililia matters, £41,500; the administration of Justice (Law would be a better word) £126,500; the Provincial Penitentiary, £12,000 ; Logislati n, £126,500 ; Education, £110,000; Civil Government, nearly £60,000; and Ocean and River Steam service, £55,000. Our territorial revenue has been £104,000; Casual £10,000; Public Works £102,000.
