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of your catechisms, " How do you know that you have a soul?" Perhaps some boy or girl will stand up and give me the answer " Because I find something within me that can think and know, can wish and desire, can rejoice and be sorry, which my body cannot do." Very good ; and now I think this answer will help us to our subject to day. For I want to show you how God's book is exactly fitted to this " something within us." God has made the beautiful world we live in to give food for our bodies, and so he has sent the Bible to give food for our souls. The scriptures teach us to " think" about the best things, and make us "know" what is most needful for us to understand; they show us what we ought most to " wish" for, and tell us how we may have what we " desire." When we " rejoice' they teach to be thankful, and when " sorry" they come to comfort us. So that there is something in this blessed book fitted to all the wants of the souls which we and all men

You cannot understand all this, my chil dren, so well now as you will, I hope, another day. Those souls of yours have more wants than you think of; and the longer you live, the more you will find these out. I am only going to speak to-day of four great blessings, that we all need; and I am sure that even the youngest here will know what these mean. We shall see that the Bible gives all four to those who read and use it rightly.

But what are they? Now attend. We need a Teacher, a Saviour, a Friend and a Home.

First. We need a teacher. We find something within us that can "think and know." But how are we to think, and what can we know? The B ble comes to teach us. Who made us? What did God create us for? What are we? How can we become good and holy ? What will become of us ? These are questions I have heard little children ask who could scarcely speak p'ainly; and have heard clever and learned men ask them too. The Bible gives the only true answers. Two children were once talking on some of these points until they got very puzzled. At last they thought they had better leave off when one said to the other, "I will go and get my Bible, Harry, for for that tells us all about it." And so it does. The Book of God is the great teacher of the world.

Secondly. We want a Saviour. Adam had a soul when God made him, that could think and know; but this second want he could not understand. As he walked in his goodness among the shadowing trees and sweet flowers of Eden, or rested on the green soft banks of its peaceful rivers, he never felt that he needed a Saviour. 
