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From our London Correspondent.

LONDON, Nov. 18th, 1859. It is very evident that unless some altogether unexpected and extraordinary events arise, an early reassembling of Parliament will not take place. Cabinet Councils, however, are frequent, and besides topics of international interest which are under discussion, others of domestic import and importance are passing under review. 'The Reform Bill that is coming must be now preparing under Sir G. C. Lewis' supervision; and as one sign of the times the Poor Law Office is collecting returns of the houses rated for the relief of the poor at a rental of £5. Even if it is intended to give the franchise to all occupiers of this description it is calculated that the addition to the registered voters of the United Kingdom (now about a million) will not exceed half a million-no overwhelming merease to the electoral constituencies of the nation, and not a large justalment of that 'Universal Suffrage' franchise which the extreme Liberal party continue to advocate and claim.


