NAPOLEON TO THE EMPRESS. Carriana, June 25. It is impossible as yet to htain the details of the battle of yesterday, The enemy withdrew last night. I have passed he night in the room occupied in the morning w the Emperor of Austria. Gen. Niel has been appointed a Marshal of

Carriana, June 26-11.30 A. M. The Austrians who had crossed the Mincio, for the purpose of attacking us with their whole body, have been obliged to abandon their positions, and withdrew to the left bank of the river. They had blown up the bridge of Gotito. The loss of the enemy is very considerable,

but ours is much less. We have taken 30 cannon, more than 7000 prisoners, and 3 flags. Gen. Niel and his corps d'armee have covered
