## EUROPEAN NEWS.

We refer our readers to the very excellent letter from our London Correspondent commencing on our first paper for the latest and most important English and Foreign news up to the sailing of the last steamer from Liverpool to Halifax. The following additional details are by the latest arrivals.

RUMORS FROM THE ZURICH CONFERENCE. A Zurich telegram of this date, 31st, says: Private conference continue to take place daily between the French and Austrian Plenipotenitaries and vesterday there was a meeting be-

tween the French and Sardinian representatives. The Paris correspondent of the Times, writing on the 30th, says that things are going on so baldly at Zurich as to render a dissolution of the Conference in a very few days probable. A Congress of war seems to some the only alternative, and a Congress, to which Austria is decidedly oppressed, would have as little success as the Conference. The designation to be given to the new kingdom has been discussed at Zurich, and Austria is willing Victor Emmanuel should be known as King of Sardinia and Lombardy, but will not consent he should describe himself as King of Upper Italy.

ZURICH, Aug. 31 .- Private conferences continue to take place between the Plempotentiaries for the last three days. The representatives of France and Austria have daily conferred together. Yesterday there was a meeting of the French and Sardinian representatives. FRANCE.

The Emperor remained in retirement in the Pyrenees. It was asserted that he would shorty proceed to Cherbourg, and also pay a second visit to the Chalons Camp.

A speech of Count Morny at the opening of the Council General of the Department of Prey de Dome, attracted considerable attention. It was regarded as an annunciation of the sentiments of the Emperor. The Count endeavored to show that the apprehensions exhibiting in England of a French invasion were quite groundless, and that, on the Contrary, France was very desirous of cementing the alliance between the two countries, and waging only manufacturing and commercial war. He denounced that portion of the English press and those members of Parliament who questioned the intentions of the French Government.

The Constitutionel, in a leading article, says the Emperor will fulfil loyally his Villafranca agreement for the restoration of the former reigning Princes of the Duchies, but if he should not succeed in re-uniting the Princes and the people in mutual accord, it is not his intention to force either one or the other.

It is not the wish of His Majesty to follow the errors of the ancient Austrian policy, whose armed intervention in the affairs of the peninsuis has ceased forever. We have given to the Italian people advice which we believe wise and prudent, which if they do not follow, it will grieve us, but which we could not press upon them by force. To us Italy owes her independence. We shall not take away from her again what we have given her yesterday. The Constitutionnel of Tuesday, contains an

article repudiating in the strongest terms, the fatricidal policy of war with England. It says the Emperor has no thought to avenge the past but to repair the future. For the sake of consolidating the English attiance, he has, on every occasion, combated the hereditary prejudices of the French people.

The situation of affairs in Italy has undergone no change. A deputation of the National Assembly of Modena has gone to Paris on a special mission to Napoleon.

Elections throughout the Romagna has taken place with the greatest tranquility and order. The official Piedmontese Gazette gives a denial to the reports of political dissention among the members of the Sardinian Cabinet.
