In Italy and France I have not seen finer fields of wheat and barley, nor in the valley of ings the Genessee the acres so heavily laden with oats. On a little field of five acres, owned by Mr. Sinclair, at Houlton, I found that there are sixty bushels to the acre this year. Sixty, seven ty, eighty, and even one hundred bushels of oats to the acre are not uncommon in this county. One individual last year reaped ninety six bashels to who does not live far from Presque Isle, last year raised 106 bushels to the acre.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE IN NEW YORK .-The efforts of private citizens, and of the Police to close the grog shops and enforce an orderly observance of the Sabbath in New York, have long been the subject of abuse in the Herald. Yet last Monday morning it made the following honest confession.

Yesterday nearly all the corner liquor saloons and basen ent groggeries had their doors closed and blinds shut. No drunkenness was reported or arrests of disorderly persons. In the city the arrests for drunkenness were less than a week ago. At the Ton bs, where more drunken and disorderly persons have been in the habit of being taken and committed on Sunday than any ber being between fifty and sixty-not a single drunken person was brought yesterday, and only two for disorderly conduct, which did not result

"More of the leading hotels kept their bars closed yesterday than any previous Suuday. It is stated that a proposition is on foot to call a meeting of hote! proprietors of the city, and see if the consent of all cannot in some way be obtained to keep their bars closed on Sunday, and give their barkeepers the rest they have so long needed on that day, and which they are new beginning to clamor loudly for."

NARROW ESSAPE OF THE STEAMSHIP ANGLO-Saxon .- At eight o'clock on Wednesday morning the 27th of July, in lat. 52 40 north, long. 53 18 west, the steamship Anglo-Saxon encountered s small field of ice, having during the preceding night passed two or three ice-bergs. The wind was light, and a-head, and the weather exceedingly thick-so dense was the fog that scarcely the length of the ship could be seen. About half past eight the fog lighted for a moment, and the look-out man sung out ' ice a-head.' The ship being under half-speed, the engines were stopped and the fog lighting a little more, an immense ice-berg of upwards of 200 feet in width and 150 in height, was seen immediately in front of the ship, and in such close proximity thereto, that although the engines were reversed, before sternway could be got upon her, the figure-head touched the ice and was slightly injured, and, as she swung round was displaced. Had not the ship entered a small "bay" in the berg, a collision, which might have been attended with serious consequences, would have taken place. Toronto Globe.

INTERESTING DISCOVERIES ON THE ISTHMUS of Panama.—The Moses Taylor, which arrived last week, brought the announcement of the discovery of great archæological wealth at Chiriqui, in the department of New Grenada. It appears that by the accidental opening of the graves of some of the ancient race of Indians, it was found that they contained images of fine wrought gold. Farther search was made, and large quantities of the same interesting and valuable relics of another and a remote age were discovered. Several specimens of these images which were doubtless the idol gods of the ancient inhabitants, were brought to this city by the Moses Taylor, and have been on exhibition at the store of Ball, Black & Co:, Jewellers, in Broadway, where they have been visited and examined by thousands.

These images are representations of frogs, bats, crocodiles, and some of them of birds and even human forms; others are combinations of the most fantastic character, not unlike some of the idols of the Eastern nations. They were apparently cast in moulds, and afterwards wrought by hand, and in some cases are quite neatly executed, while the most of them are very rude. The gold of which they are made is of various qualities. Some of it is of the finest quality, but other specimens are slightly alloyed with copper, giving to the metal a reddish cast. The weight of one of these images is more than six ounces, and its value more than \$100.

The market value of the gold already found in the huacos or graves of the aborigines amounted, within five days after the discovery, to \$150,000; one man had \$10,000 worth.
