

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

"Well," says some little boy or girl, "that is a funny way to keep bread, and yet it is in the Bible, so it must be true, I'm sure I can not tell how."

Will you let Auntie Kate tell you, then, that what we call bread is not known in all parts of the world as such. Rice takes the place of bread in many countries; indeed, it is said to be the chief food of one third the human race. It is cultivated in low lands, which are entirely covered with water at some seasons of the year, so that, instead of speaking of winter and summer, as we do. the people talk about the wet season and the dry season. When the waters have run off, and the mud is partially dry, the rice is sown very thickly. Then the water is made to flow over it again, and when the plants are five or six inches high, they are translated so as to be a foot apart each way, and remain covered with water until ripe, when the straw is yellow. In some countries, however, the people go out in boats, and sow the rice literally "upon the waters," and "after many days," that is, at the beginning of the dry season, they reap their harvest.


