News of the Week.

RAILROAD TO SUSSEX VALE .- The most important domestic news of this week, is the opening of the line of Railway to Sussex Vale, a distance of 45 miles from the City. JOHN BROWN, the leader of the Harper Ferry Tragedy, has had his trial burned through, and has received his sentence to be executed on the 2d of December next. Little hope of reprieve or commutation exists. Great excitement exists not only in Virginia, but in different parts of the Union. Mrs. Maria L. Childs, the well known authoress, volunteered her services to nurse Brown and dress his wounds while in prison .-Other letters of condolence and sympathy from ladies and others were received by him, but all condemning his precipitancy and error in taking up arms in the cause in which he was engaged. Sermons also have been preached on the subject; one by Henry Ward Beecher, published in several papers, is very able and bold.

There is in our judgment much excuse for Brown; he had been goaded to madness by the pro-slavery party in Kausas, by whose cruelty two of his sons had come to their death, which with other causes, had inspired him with hatred to slavery.

THE VICTORIA BRIDGE IN MONTREAL.-The Victoria Bribge across the St. Lawrence at Montreal was commenced in 1854, and it is expected that it will be com, leted in the course of next month. The cost will be between seven and \$3,000,000. The number of men employed upon it now, is 3000, with six steamboats, 72 barges, and also several smaller crafts, and 143 horses, and 4 locomotives. The amount if wages daily is \$5000. The bridge is 9083 feet, or nearly one mile and three quarters in length. There are three million cubic feet of masonry, ten thousand tons of iron in the tube, two million rivets, and one humired and sixty-eight acres of painting. There are twentg-five spaces of 242 feet, the centre one, which is 330 feet. There is a rise of forty feet to the mile to the centre of the bridge. The centre pier is 24 feet in width, and the other 16 feet. - Each of the piers and abutments is furnished with a cut-water, which will act as an ice-breaker when it breaks up in the spring. The centre pier is 60 feet high and the abutinents 36 feet. Some of the blocks of stone weigh seventeen tons, but the average covers two openings, and at each of ernate opening, or at every 484 feet, a space of eight inches which move on plated beds.
