THE CONFERENCE. Date for Zurich Conference not yet fixed, expected to meet in a few days. Count Colloredo, representative for Austria, reached Marsfield, 27th, and it is said, proceeded direct to Zurich.

On the 28th, in the Commons, Lord John Russell made his statement relative to foreign affairs. He would have been able to announce a definite settlement of affairs on the Continent before the approaching close of the Session.
