After the examination of witnesses, Thomas Bowyer, the prisoner, addressed the Jurors as foilows :-- I was passing up the sidewalk near the end of the Bridge at 2 o'clock, and met James and George Clarke and passed the time of day with them. James Clarke asked me to go hack and take some liquor with him. I refused. He posisted that I should co so. I told him I would not. He then took hold of me to haul me back. I jerked away from him and ran up the sidewalk. He followed me and struck me with his fist under the car, at which I put my hand in my pocket, took out my knile and struck him with it. When I done so, I had no intention of injuring or hurting him. After striking Clarke I walked on towards Milltown.

The verdict of the Jury was-"That the said James Clarke came to his death by being struck and pierced in the side with a certain knife in the hands of Thomas Bowyer, making a montal wound, of which said mortal wound he, the said James Clarke, died, and not otherwise." The prisoner was committed and forwarded to


