The Neapolitan Exiles.

Sigismondo Castromediano, Duke of Cabellino

one of the Neapolitan exiles who recently landed at Queenstown, Ireland, in a communication to the Cork Reporter, gives a graphic outline of the sufferings which he and fifty companions endured for eight years in the prisons of Naples, Their experience was indeed and of great mental and bodily anguish, and the narratives which they will doubtless give to the world will add new infumy to the character of the King of Naples. These and other victims of his cruelty, it will be ramembered, were incarcerated for alleged political offenses, of which they were convicted by perjured witness and corrupt judges. The fifty whose prison-history Castromediano narrates, embraced a number of very eminent citizens, and were gathered from various prisons in 1852, and first thrown into the stifling dens of Monte Fusco, the place where for ages the most desperate bandits of the kingdom were congregated, and only left for the gibbet. Here, amid dripping wall's and dark cells, with the freezing winds penetrating through the broken but stoutly barred windows, and bound with chains, the victims of tyranny passed the dreary hours, sleeping at night on the bare earth. They were dressed as malefactors, and deprived of books, and for a time even of materials for writing to their friends. When at last they were allowed to write to their friends, it was only to give an account of their health. Even this privilege was limited to five individuals each day, and all dressed as malefactors, and deprived of books, limited to five individuals each day, and all letters and the answers were obliged to be left unsealed. To gratify the hatred of their jailors, they were chained to staples in the floor, and their fetters reduced to the length of four feet, while to their physical sufferings were added the grossest insults. To render their pangs still more acute and corroding, they were cut off from conversation with those who had them in charge, even the sbirri being ordered not to address a word to them, and any one of them who evinced a merciful disposition or kindness to the prisoners was tried by court-martial and flogged. A priest, who, observing them through the grating as he was pursuing his sacred duties, pronounced a blessing upon them, was instantly seized and sent to a distant district, where he is kept under surveillance. The birds of heaven, even, were not allowed to solace their cheerful notes. A nightingale which used to come to a Cordwood Maple, mulberry tree by the prison and poor forth his carols, thus imparting pleasure to the prisoners, who thronged to the prison bars to drink in his melody, was regarded by the suspicious police as a means of communication with the outer world, and shouting and pelting not causing him

to forsake his favorite haunt, he was shot!
