The National government have taken prompt measures in the case, and a corps of marines from the Washington barracks and three companies from Old Point were forwarded to Harper's Ferry by a train which left Washington at 3.15 yesterday afternoon. The city of Baltimore has also sent several companies of military to the scene of the disturbance, and volunteers will probably gather from all quarters.

Effectual measures have been taken to guard the city of Washington, should the insurrection spread.

No satisfactory reason is given for this sudden and unexpected outbreak. A dispatch from Baltimore says that some are of the opinion that the sole object was plunder, it being generally understood that a large amount of funds had been deposited at the government pay house on Sa. turday. A dispatch from Washington accounts for the uprising on the ground that a contractor for the construction of a dam had run away some time since without paying his workmen, several hundred in number, and that they combined to plunder the government pay house. But whatever the cause of the insurrection may be, we can entertain no doubt that it will be speedily suppressed. This takes the state of the land
