PROHIBITION OR PRISONS .- A California paper after announcing that upwards of thirty-six thousand hogsheads, pipes, casks and cases of spirituous liquors were in course of tirnsit to that state, makes the following comments :-"Allowing thirty gallons to each case, we

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have the enormous quantity of one million one hundred ane fifty four thousand nine hundred and forty gallons; all of which is soon to be landed upon our wharves, rolled into our warehouses, and there by process of adulteration increased into at least fwice the quantity. When all this is done, and this immense title begins to sweep over the State, then room must be made in our County Jails and State Prison. Another army of criminals will swell the ranks which already fill our numerous prisons, and overflow our peritentiary .- Soon the records will come in to sum up the awful carse which is now on it way. Murders, manslaghters, attempts to kill assaults, larcenies, besides petry crimes without number. But the unwritten record is darker, statistics. The tears of widows, the hunger and nakedness of crphans, the darkness and despair of the hard state of innocent victims, the demoralization of families down to the third and fourth generation, are not matters which come within the jurisdiction of earthly tribunals, although they are the direct consequences which must soon do one of two things; either give us a prohibitory law to enlarge and multiply our prisions. Which of these two measures will result to the greatest good of the State, it is not difficult to designate.'
