Union Street, from his residence, and Jeffries Hill, along where it was understood, or supposed, His Royal Highness would pass on his way to the Railway Station, were thronged on both sides with spectators, anxious to get another glimpse at the Prince. At nine o'clocd his carriage came out. The Prince was attirek in a blue sack coat, grey or light panta-loons and white hat, altogether as a private gentlemen. Instead of turning up Union street the York Point, over Portland Bridge, through Paradise Row, over the Railway Bridge, under the Triumphal Arch, and so on to the Station. The disappointment to the thousands who had beer waiting along the supposed route for a long time, was excrutiating when they learned that the Prince had gone the other way, as if (some folks

said) intentionally (not on his part of course) to avoid them. They all thought, however, that they were sold. "The Prince of Wales" car, beautifully fitted up inside, for the purpose, was in readiness to receive the Royal party. Or moving off, the Prince came out and stood on the platform and bowed to the crowds gathered about the place, who cheered him lustily, as it there was as much heart as lungs engaged in the good work, He continued standing on the platform all the way out to Rothsay (9 miles,) acknowledging the cheers that greeted him, from house and hut, along the road.
ARIVAL AT ROTHSAY.

The cars reached Rothsay at half-past 9 o'clock The beautiful temple, with canopied top, built as a stopping place for the royal ear, was gaily decorated with colours. On the arrival a salute was fired from the Volunteer Artillery, under command of Colonel Foster.
