FREDERICTON. Feb. 13th, 1860. Messrs Editors,-The annual Session of the Legislature for the year 1860, being the third General Session of the present House, has commenced its deliberations. Although there may be nothing new to interest your readers, it may be very desirable of that fact itself being known.

The exterior of the Provincial Buildings appear The exterior of the Provincial Buildings appear ancient and delapidated, as though they had been comfortable appearance. The space allotted for public business is, however, far too small, and tends greatly to the inconvenience of the representatives of the people, who are compelled to sit huddled together like a flock of sheep, closely surrounded by a crowd ofindividuals who appear to have no other business but daily to jam the lobies and vacant spaces of the buildings, to the annoyance and inconvienence, not only of the Logislature, but also to strangers who occasionally visit the metropolis.

The excellent Legislative Library has been further replenished during the past year by some hundred volumes, comprising works on Biogra-1 by, Autobiography, Despatches, Correspondence, Theology and Metaphysics, Philology and Education, Jurisprudence, Legislation, Political Economy, Commerce, &c., the whole being still under the charge of the old and very obliging Librarian, M. Needham, Esq.

I heard the late Provincial Secretary remark the other day in the House of Assembly, that the charges of public printing had become enormous, from the fact that the Government had bought up a large portion of the Press of the country through useless and extravagant advertising, which may some measure account for it; but I shall leave him and the Press to settle this account for themselves.

The House has made arrangements for the publication of 1500 Journals, and 4000 copies of the Reports of the Debates, which will be divided among the respective members for distribution, giving those representing small constituencies an opportunity of placing a copy in the hands of a large portion of the electors.
