the Prince in due form : the luncheon enjoyedbut why give details? Three men lost their lives in firing salutes ; and one person was crnshed to death by the pressure of the crowd. This morning's paper has not yet arrived in town, so that the proceedings are brought down to a period not later than Saturday evening. But the letter is quite lenghty enough. 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News of the Week.

THE PRINCE IN MONTREAL. The following account of H. R. Highness laying the last stone and driving the last rivet in the great Victoria Bridge, &c., &c., is from the "Montreal Herald":- -

At half-past one o'clock precisely, H. R. H. arrived at the bridge, riding, with his suite, from the station in a beautiful carriage open at the sides, lined with crimson velvet, and with panels appropriately decorated. This carriage was driven by Mr. McKenzie, the superintendent of the machinery of the Company. The Prince immediately ascended the stairs to the scaffold at the top of the pier. He was met by Mr. Jas. Hodges, and was accompanied by the Duke of Newcastle, General Bruce, Lord St. Germains, General Williams, and the respective suites of His Royal Highness, the Governor General, and the Commander in Chief. Mr. Hodges then, hat in hand, presented to the Prince, who also howed and was uncovered, a wooden mallet and a silver trowel.

THE TROWEL. The trowel bore on the inside the following inscription :---

TO COMMEMORATE Th completion of the Victoria Bridge by His Royal Highness Albert Edward Prince of Wales. MONTREAL, 1800.

On the reverse was an engraving of the bridge. The handle was wrought into the form of a Beaver, which was attached to the blade by a Prince of Wales' plum-, the edges of the blade being decorated with a border of the Kose, Shamrock, Thistle and Maple Leaf. LAYING THE STONF.

His Royal Highness took the trowel, and with a few dexterous strokes levelled the mortar, previously roughly spread. The stone was then lowered under the directions of Messys. Mathew Turner and Daniel Wilson, who have been Mr. Hodge's foremen in the masonry department from the beginning of the bridge. While the tackle was being adjusted, H. R. H. looked with evident interest on the broad river scenery before him, and made smiling observations to the Dake of Newcastle and the Governor General. At length the large mass was lowered to its permanent resting place. It was a stone of 10 fet long by 6 broad and 2 deep, weighing several tons. The Prince concluded this part of the ceremony by giving one or two formal taps with the masonic gavel, and the Bridge was completed, and to be henceforth known by the name of Victoria. THE COMPANY ON THE PLATFORM. On the platform at this time, we observed the Duke of Newcastle, Lord Germains, the Governor General, General Bruce, Admiral Milne, Captain Hope of the Flying Fish, Major Teesdale, Captain Grey, Lord Lyons, Commondore Seymour, His Lordship the Bishop of Montreal, Dr. Mathewson, the Hon. James Young, most of the Members of the Executive Council, Dr. Acland, Mr. Engelhart, Secretary to the Duke, Sir. All n McNab, Mr. Blackwell, most of the Directors of the Grand Trunk R. R. ; Mr. Shanley, Mr. Trembinski, Sir W. Logan, Sir H Smith the Speaker, the commanders of the "Siyx and Valorous," and several other gentlemen. The Band of the Canadian rifles was in attendance. and played "God Save the Queen," as the ceremony was concluded. THE LAST RIVET. The last stone having been laid, H. R. H. and a large number of the official gentlemen in attendance upon him, took the royal car and proceeded to the central arch, where the last rivet was to be driven,-an operation which was executed by the Prince with great spirit and good-will. Three rivers were first driven by the men, the Prince having first selected the hole which he would fill. This happened to he a tolerably high one-about the level of his head and some of the bystanders suggested that a more convenient one should be selected. But the Prince adhered to his own choice. Those who have seen the rivets criven knew that it is done with a very rapidly repeated stroke, and when H. R. H. observed the dexterity of the workmen, he observed that he was atraid he should prove only a bungling hand. However, the last rivet being pushed through, he took the small hammer, and after given two or three taps to steady the bolt, Mr. Hedges having applied the cupping tool and giving him a large hammer, of several pounds weight, he speedily completed this very last touch to the great structure. DEPARTURE OF THE GUESTS. The Royal carriage having then passed through the bridge to the south side of the river; the guests embarked and proceeded to the station. Those who had no invitations to the luncheon speedly dispersed, and those who had, took the road to the shed where lunch had been provided. Six hundred guests sat down to an admirable dejeuner prepared, so far as the eatables were concerned, by Messrs. Hogan and Penn, but in other respects, under the direction of Mr. T. S. Scott. The company in general were seated at long tables, the roof being decorated with stripes of various colours. At the head was a dais, at which sat Sir E. W. Head as President.
