PEWS IN REV. H. W. BEECHER'S CHURCH .-The regular annual sale of the pews in Rev. Heury Ward Beecher's church, in Brooklyn, took lace on Tuesday evening. The highest premium vas \$100, and the lowest 25 cents. The assessd value of the pews was set down at \$12,050, eing the same as last year. To this was added, or premiums upon pews, the sum of \$16,690 25, the assessed value of the chairs \$668, with premiums thereon \$21,25, thus resulting is the net sum of \$29,429 50, being about 40 per cent. increase upon the amount realized last year.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5th, 1860. MR. EDITOR :- I claim not to be prophet; nor the son of a prophet; but most of your readers will remember that I ventured one prophecy

when the Nebraska bill passed, viz :- that it was the beginning of sorrows for our nation. The Missouri compromise, as it was called provided that slavery should never come north of a certain line; but liberty north of it at all hazards. The Pierce administration repealed that act by what is called the Nebraska bill. Many of the best men n the Democratic party then left it.

The beginning of sorrows I said. That open-Kansas and Nebraska to slavery, though had before been consecrated to freedom by the athers of the government. These territories being thus thrown open, both slave-holders and free laborers rushed to Kansas which is bordered on two sides by slave states. The attempt on the other to make it free. . The federal government went for slavery and aided and abetted the slaveholders which were greatly in the minority. Hence the civil wars in Kansas. In these wars John Brown, recently executed, had two sons slain in a cruel manner, and otherwise he suffered severely at the hands of the slaveholders that came over to Kansas in troops to help their friends to vote and fight. But thanks to God, he has wonderfully delivered both Kansas and Ne braska from the cusre of slavery.

But Brown, though Kansas was delivered, ha not forgotten that slavery had robbed him of his sons and property. He determined to carry the war into Africa. You know his attack upon slavery, which resulted in the Harper's Ferry affair. According to human wisdom this was both foolish and insane; but God can take a worm to thrash nountains. The whole slave region is most teribly affrighted and the slaveholders are determined to remain in a state of fright with or without cause. Since the execution of Brown, Conress has met and the first day of the session the slaveholders started the discussion on slavery. In the Senate a slaveholder asked a committee to investigate the affair about Brown. This set the slaveholder offered a resolution in the House to the effect that no man was fit for Speaker if he had recommended a book known as "Helper's Impending Crisis." This was aimed at Mr. Sherman, the Anti-Slavery candidate for Speaker. The discussion has been going on from the first Monday of December till the present, the house not being able to elect a speaker, that is, to organize the clerk of last Congress presiding simply pro tem.

Helper is a young man of North Carolina. He is yet under thirty, though his book was published three or four years ago. He is a non-slaveholder. He noticed with pain the want of enterprise in the Southern States as compared with the Northern, and was led to seek for the cause. He became convinced that slavery was to be charged with the want of prosperity in his native state. He began to examine the United States' census, to compare the products of the slave states with those of the Free States, and so of population, schools, churches, commerce, manufactures, &c., &c. From this comparison he became deeply impressed that the slave states were hastening to bankruptcy and decay in all the interests that go to make a State great. Under this impression he wrote a book to set forth that "Impending crisis of the south," and gave it as a title to his book in which he sets forth the facts in many statistical tables, the figures being mostly compiled destructive to their own interests. He showed that the slaveholders all told are less than 350,000 out of a population of 25,000,000 and that so few men ought at once to be checked in their mad career which was fast reducing the non-slavehulders to degradation as well as the slaves. . It is this appeal to the non-slaveholders, with

facts and figures, that so incensed the slaveholders. The book does not address a word to slaves; not a word that I can recall, though I read the work entirely, years ago. It is the fear that the "white trash," as the slaveholders contemptuously call ther non-slaveholding fellow citizens length combine to overthrow the oligarchy of oppressors, that so sets on fire the slaveholder when he reads Helper's book.

Missouri borders on Kansas. The citizens of Missouri did all they could to carry slavery into that territory. The scheme not only failed, but wery unexpectedly it started the strife in Missouri itself, between Free labour and slave labour. A congressman opposed to slavery was elected from St. Louis, the chief city of that State. The anti-slavery men also carried the election in other places. The slaves are very rapidly disaptored by an engineer, and it is proposed to urge upon the Legislature and Government the necessity of proceeding with the erection forthwith.

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Missouri would by 1860 give her vote for freedom, In such a state of things it seemed very desirable to circulate intelligence among the non-slaveholders of Missouri and they naturally preferred Helper's book to all others, as it not only had the right kind of facts, but it was written by one of the class to whom the appeal was to be made.
