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A letter from Pesth says :- 'The die is castthe Austrian Government has resolved to adopt a rigorous policy towards Hungary, instead of redressing her manifold grievances. It has, already, indeed, with greater alacrity than generally distinguishes it movements, begun to put rigorous movements in force, and the Protestants have been selected as the first victims. No fewer than 180-I say one hundred and eighty-Protestant noblemen and gentlemen of Kæsmark and Miskoloz have within the last few days been cast into prison, or been cited before the magistrates, for having taken a part, more or less active, in the assemblies which protested against the Imperial Patent of the 1st of September. Moreover, the houses of these noblemen and gentlemen have been searched from top to bottom, and all their private papers and correspondence tality; even females of all ages were actually turned out of their beds by gendarmes, and their very beds were coarsely examined! Among the persons who have been thrown into prison at Kæsmark are Baron Zsedengi and the Rev. Mr. Topoerozer-two gentleman highly esteemed by their neighbours. In the search of their houses, such wanton brutality was displayed by the Austrian authorities who conducted the operation, that three of the gendarmes (Hungarians) could scarcely refrain from expressing their indignation and the next day these three men waited on the families of the two prisoners, and, with tears in their eyes, implored pardon for having been obliged, in discharge of ther duty, to figure in such odious scenes. They at the same time announced that, in order not again to be made the instruments of outraging their countrymen, they had resigned their places in the gendarmerie.'

DEPLORABLE CONDITION OF THE PAPAL STATES .- A correspondent of the Daily Telegraph writing from Rome, says :- Arrests are continually made without regard to age, sex, or condition. The volunteers who served in the late campaign and were weak enough to return, under a kind of amnesty promised to them by the Government, have been nearly all arrested, without the least pretext for such an unjustifiable proceeding, except the burning vindictiveness of the priests. Many, just arrived, have been obliged to take flight to avoid falling into the hands of these demons. At Ancona, several women, mothers of large families, who have incurred the displeasure of the Sanfedisti, have been dragged to the dungeons of the Roman prisons, leaving their poor children totally unprovided with the means of existence.-Persons are arrested for having in their possession portraits of Victor Emmanuel, Garibaldi, Cavour; and even some for having those of the French Emperor and his Generals.

DISCONTENT IN POLAND .- A letter of the 11th, from Berlin, says :- " Every letter from the Polish frontier speaks of the profound discontent existing in that country, as also in Lithuania and Volhynia, since all the hopes built upon the accession of the Emperor Alexander were overthrown. Hardly a political concession made to Russia has been extended to Poland; the Polish press is mute; the Polish nobility is not allowed to meet and form any organization like the Russian; and its opinion is not asked on questions of reform, though far more favourable to the cause of reform than the nobles of Russia. Not one of the amnestied exiles who have returned has been put again in possession of his estates. All that has been done was to declare, on the 7th of September last, when the hereditary Grand Duke came of age, that no further steps would be taken towards the fresh confiscation of estates, but even the proclamation is not respected by the Governors. On the contrary, they take advantage of the amnesty to make supplementary confiscations, that are merely done for the sake of enriching the generals and high officials, to whom the revenues of the estates are paid.

RELIGION IN TUSCANY .- The Florence correspondent to the London Times writes as follows: "I some time ago alluded to what is called Evangelical Christianity" in Tuscany. The movement seems daily to assume more significant dimentions. Two, three, five hundred, or a thousand people meet of a Sunday evening in this town, in and about the small room doing duty for a chapel. The brethren are loudly calling for a larger building. They number I am told, at least 300 communicants, and, though all those who crowd to the door of the little congregation are not converts (for no less than thirty priests in their custom were seen in the throng on Sunday last), still it is difficult to calculate the results of this affluence of people to such a place of this free distribution of Bibles and religious tracts among persons of all classes. Nor is the movement by any means limited to this capital. Everywhere throughout Tuscany, and still more in the Romagnas, are the books spread, and people induced to join in the perusal of them. These new congregations have as yet no definite symbols, no established clergy, no appointed teachers; they profess to ground their truth on the Gospel and on the freedom of inquiry. on the freedom of inquiry.
