

TWENTY-FOUR HOURS AT A CAMP MEETING (Concluded.)

It is conceded by many who oppose Campmeetings, that the aims of their promoters are good. They recognize the desire to advance the divine glory, whil they regard the means em ployed as not adapted to that end. The opposition of others is mere prejudice and ili-wili, and is shown by contemptous remarks, and the portraying of scenes intended to bring discredit upon the practice. Argument and expostelation. are generally thrown away upon such persons. Let no admirer of camp-meetings render railing for railing. Michael, the orch-ang- 1, when contending with no less wicked a personage than the devil, durst not tring against him a rading accusation, but said : The Lord rebuke thee. wish we were accustomed to do likewise, under less provocation !

Among the ADVANTAGES of Camp-meetings, the following impress the judgment of the writer :--

1. THEY BRING MANY TOGETHER, AND GIVE A GOOD OPPORTUNITY OF PREACHING THE GOSPEL -Some of them came foin mere curiosity, doubtless; and some to scoff; and some even to create disturbance, if they can ; yet it is something to get the people together. If Christians were permitted to summon and address no assemtly in which there were persons whose curiosity or even worse motives had brought together, would they ever lift up their voices in the great congregation? Would not the lips of Christ himself have been closed, since Scribes and Pharisees mingled with every assembly ? "The multi ude came together," says Luke in speaking of the day of Pentecost. They were arxious to see and hear. Some mocked and said : "These men are full of new wine," or to put it into modern phraseology, " These men are drunk !" So long as no improper means were used to draw out the people, let them come by hundreds and by thousands. The difficulty of controlling so many is admitted. Was it less in our Lord's time? "But they plan to remain for nights and days together at Camp-meeting+." objects some one. Granted : and Christ s id of several thousands : " They continue with me now three days, ("hich involved at least two nights,) and have nothing to eat." This, and not the danger of having their morals corrupted, rendered it necessary that they should be dismissed or fed. 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
