"The statistics of infant mortality justify us in saying, that there are born in New York every year, (and more or less in every other city,) six thousand, and perhaps ten thousand children, in eircumstances as will insure the death of one half of them before they are twelve months old, and of three fourths of them before the age of five years, as certainly as if they were placed in front of a battle, between two contending armies, where the discharges of cannon and musketry, thick and constant, from either side, should play through their ranks hour after hour; and where a large part of the survivers will grow up crippled in health, and contaminated in morals, as certainly as any effect follows from its legitimate cause. And these are they whom God has committed to the care of Christian society, saying, " Feed my lambs"-provide them with all that is necessary for healthy, physical, mental, and
