

ARRIVAL OF THE "ADRIATIC."

The Adriatic arrived at New York on July 1st, bringing English papers of June 26th. The news relates chiefly to the Conference at Baden. The Duke of Coburg, Gotha, and the Kings of Saxony, Hanover and Wurttemberg arrived on the 15th. The Regent of Prussia who had arrived previously, visited them. Napoleon arrived at 7 in the evening, and was received with the usual honours. The Regent sent Lieut. Von Loe to present his compliments, and an hour and a half after the Emperor's arrival, he and his family, accompanied by the Duke of Hamilton, but did not find her at home.

On the 16th all the Sovereigns attended at a dinner at the palace. They breakfasted there next day, and dined at the Duke's chateau, and in the evening there was a concert, and the opinion was the Congress would strengthen peace.

Next morning the Emperor took a walk, and was surrounded by crowds. In the evening the Princes met at the Palace, which was illuminated. Visits were again exchanged. The Duke of Nassau arrived. The Emperor would leave on Sunday for Paris.

It is asserted that at a preliminary conference of the German Princes on the 15th, an agreeable unanimity was manifested on all questions referring to the relations of Germany with the foreign powers, whereby the principal object of the meeting of the Princes has already been attained.

Saturday Afternoon.—It is asserted on good authority that at yesterday's interview with the Emperor, the Regent of Prussia, the Emperor Napoleon repeated his peaceful assurances, and said that he desired the interview in order to express them verbally.

Paris, Saturday, June 16.—The Pays contains the following: "The interview between the Emperor and the Prince Regent was most cordial. It is asserted that communications exchanged between Berlin and Vienna represent the interview at Baden as most auspicious event, and as a token of the general pacification of Germany and Europe."

ARRIVAL OF THE "PARANA" AT ST. JOHN'S, N.F.

St. John's, July 5. Caught upon starting, 26th, low bottom and part port cylinder. Parana was steamer dispatched in her place, and arrived here this morning.

Reported Gladstone determined to resign on account of time report adopted by Commons. Committee on Lords' rejection of Bill repealing Paper Duty.

Volunteers review by the Queen was a brilliant success—over 20,000 men in line.

Prince Jerome Bonaparte is dead. Napoleon visits Savoy in July. Since Emperor's return from Baden troops concentrated on the Eastern frontier of France withdrawn.

Reported French loan will be twenty or thirty millions sterling.

Austrians making vast Military preparations at Venice.

Baring Brothers introduced new Russian loan of £200,000 sterling in London—44 per cent. at 92.

China mail telegraphed. Steamer Malabar having on board Lord Elgin and Baron Gros, was wrecked off harbour of Galle; no lives lost.

ARRIVAL OF THE GREAT EASTERN.

The Great Eastern has arrived; at 7½ o'clock yesterday morning she came to anchor off the lights at Sandy Hook, after a voyage of 11 days, and within an hour the news was flashed all over the Union. Her best performance was 333 nautical miles in 24 hours, and had she been run at full speed, and by the most direct route, her passengers assert that she would have made the passage inside of nine days.

The cautiousness of Capt. Vine Hall, however, led him to deviate occasionally to the southward of the true course, much time was spent verifying and correcting the compasses, and there was a very considerable difference.

She came into port much lighter than she usually sail, in order to cross the bar; but this fact is counterbalanced by the fullness of her bottom, which very much retarded her speed.

Her crew parted the water without a ripple, and she left it cleaner than any ship we ever saw. She is stiff and staunch—so much so that her great engines, wheels and paddles impart scarcely a perceptible vibration to her frame. She moves through the water with the least well conceivable for so vast a hull.

She will remain on exhibition at the foot of Hammond street for the next six weeks, for the benefit of her stockholders.

As the Great Eastern crossed the bar, she dipped the ensign which was flying at her mast and fired a royal salute, while the band on board struck up Hail Columbia and the Star Spangled Banner. After crossing the bar the paddle-wheels of the steamer were put in motion, when she began to once to walk away from the bay.

She was accompanied by the Revenue Cutter Harriet Lane, which fired a salute just outside the Narrows. Another salute was fired from Fort Washington, and answered by the Great Eastern. As the flotilla came through the narrows up to the strait ground, the scene was magnificently stirring and beautiful beyond description. A great number of smaller boats, tugs, ferry boats, and steamers of all descriptions were swarming down with loads of shouting and excited passengers. The tops of the houses all along the shores of Staten Island were crowded with people.

The great ship came to off her landing place, foot of Hammond street, about 5 o'clock, and before 7 the steamer had been safely moored alongside the long pier between Hammond and Troy streets.

FIRE.—A fire broke out on Friday, at about 3 o'clock, in a barn in the rear of the property on Union street, owned by Thomas Crozier, Esq. The barn was destroyed, and two houses adjoining from the alley leading from Charlotte street, were considerably damaged. One of these houses is owned we believe, by the estate of the late Jas. Gerow. We did not learn whether there was any insurance upon the properties. The firemen were, as usual, quickly on the ground with their Engines; and gave a fresh proof of the efficiency of the Fire Department.—N.B.R.

FIRE.—Two large houses on Brussels street, together with several out-buildings, were completely destroyed last evening between ten and eleven. The house where the fire broke out belonged to a man named Connelly, and the house adjoining to a man named Culbert; another house belonging to Mr. Dinn, received considerable injury. The parties, we learn, are insured.—N.B.R.

We are glad to learn that the sufferers at the late fire at Barlow's Corner were insured to a certain extent. Messrs. Whitaker & Purinton Clothiers, were insured for £1750. Mr. Benson for £500. Mr. Ellison for £300. Mr. Carson for £700, and Messrs. M-Cart and Everett were insured to a certain extent, but we did not learn the amount.—Globe.

FIRE AND ROBBERY IN FREDERICKTOWN.—Yesterday a fire originated in the Tannery and Finishing shop of Messrs. McKenzie and McCandless, and it is said by some defect of a chimney. The Fire Companies were almost instantaneously on the spot, and a water tank being in the vicinity, the casualty which otherwise, owing to the drought and high wind at the time, might have been a serious one, was suppressed with little loss. The goods in the corner of Queen's and Westmorland streets was on Tuesday night entered by a robber, who stole about 15 shillings in money and £15 worth in Boots and Shoes.—Reporter.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—A fine, promising young lad, named James Pine Clark, thirteen and a half years old, was drowned in the Mill Pond, at Wolf Brook, Parish of St. Martin's, on the morning of the 25th ult. He was on a visit to Mr. Noah Dowdell's, and while the family were at breakfast, the deceased left the table and went into the mill pond to fish for trout. Not more than ten or fifteen minutes had elapsed before he was looked for, but could not be found. His fishing rod and cap were seen floating on the pond; the gates were immediately lifted, but the water drawn off, and the body recovered, but all efforts to restore animation were in vain. The victim spark had died. The deceased was a son of the late Thomas and Sarah Ann Clark of this City.—News.

There was a special session of the magistrates in this city and County held in the Court House yesterday, when the Hon. John Robertson, W. H. Scott, Esq., and Dr. William Bayard, were appointed Hospital Commissioners under the Act passed at the last session of the Legislature.

The Common Council is authorized to appoint two Commissioners, when the Board will be complete. We trust, however, that no assessments will be ordered until the act is amended, as the principle upon which they are required to be levied is most unfair and unjust.—Church Witness.

THE RAILROAD.—There were over two hundred passengers by the Rail-train yesterday morning, from Sussex and intermediate places, and there appeared to be nearly as many by the up-train at 8 o'clock.—thus demonstrating the advantage of cheap over high fares. Yesterday being one of the excursion days.—Globe.

It is stated that a ledge of gold-bearing quartz has been discovered in Nova Scotia, between the settlements of Musquodoboit and the shore, some distance about the head waters of Tangier River. At least one thousand persons are said to be at work there.—Ib.

The Miramichi "Gleaner" says: We are sorry to hear that the grubbers are cutting down almost everything green in the fields and gardens. The caterpillars are eating up all the gooseberry and currant bushes. A pound of saleratus dissolved in two gallons of water and sprinkled on the bushes, will destroy the insects.—the late seasonable rains have improved the grass materially.

On Thursday evening of last week, a house occupied by Mr. McCollum, near the Ridge, was struck by lightning. The rafters were split, the corner posts knocked out, and some other damage done. None of the family were in the house at the time.

Another house near the residence of Mr. John P. Grimmer was struck, and was thought at one time to be on fire, but having one of the rods of the American Company on it, it was preserved.—St. Croix Herald.

The Halifax Journal says there are at least one thousand gold mines in Nova Scotia.

One of the engines between Shediac and Moncton, ran off the track on Saturday last, but without doing much damage. No one was to blame, the accretions being purely accidental.—Burdette.

COAL BANK ON FIRE.—A coal bank, belonging to Alfred Patterson, near the residence of General Beeson, in North Union, Fayette county, Pa., says the Pittsburgh Post of April 30, is at present the scene of a fire, and has been for about six weeks. It caught from a fire kindled by some young men, which they failed fully to extinguish when leaving the bank. Catching a prop, it communicated with the coal, and spread till it now covers a large space. All attempts to extinguish the fire have thus far proved abortive, and the result may be similar to that of a burning mountain in the same State, where a hill of coal has been burning for years, and continues to burn, without any probability of being extinguished.
