"On Saturday, we regret to say, the Orange trouble broke out in a new spot. It seems that on his arrival at Government House, on Friday evening, after passing through the streets in triumphal procession from the landing—the Duke of Newcastle vehemently complained that he had been deceived; he protested that he had been decoved to the city by the assurance that there would he no party emblems on any of the arches, borne by any person taking part in the processions, whereas the arch at the intersection of King and Church-streets was decorated with a transparency of King William III. His Grace severely blamed the Mayor; he referred to a letter addressed to him at Whitby, by Mr. Wilson, in which it was stated that the Orangemen intended to take down the portrait of King William, and substitute that of the Prince of Wales, and complained that this had not been done.

" As the result of this affair, a courteous hint was given on Saturday morning, that the presence of the Mayor and Corporation at the levee would not be acceptable; correspondence between the Duke and the Mayor followed, which ended in a satisfactory adjustment of the difficulty but not in time to enable the City Fathers to be presented to the Prince. It is understood, however, that they will enjoy this honour to-day. When the Royal party have departed, we suppose the whole correspondence will be published, and it will then appear clearly how little open to censure the Mayor was.

"Sunday though it was, the Orange wound came very near breaking out afresh yesterday. It was of course known, throughout the city, that the Prince would attend public worship in the Church of England Cathedral in the morningand King-street was in consequence crowded, from Government House to the Cathedral, with persons anxious to get one peep at his Hoyal William upon it, was standing defiantly in the way! There was no possibility of reaching the Cathedral by King street without passing under the portrait of the greatest Prince that ever sat on the British throne ! Mordecai sat in the gate. Fortunately there are other streets besides Kingstree in Toronto, and so the Royal cortege proceeded north to Queen-street, and having escaped the dreaded object, got safely into church.

"We regret to say that his little dodge soon got wind, and so exasperated some of the more fierce of "the brethren" that notwithstanding orders to leave Vienna for Trieste. the earnest exertions of leading Orangemen to prevent it, unmistakeable Orange emblems were planted in abundance on the arch while the service was proceeding in the Church. When his Royal Highness left the Cathedral, at the close of the service, he was loadly cheered by the crowd assembled on the street, The Royal carriages went east to Market-street, south to Front-street and thence to Government House, thereby again avoiding the Orange arch."

Except where the weather compelled a change, the pragramme has been followed; and for the present the Orange difficulties are suspended. We have had a terriffic disaster on Lake Mich-

igan. The steamer "Lady Elgin" was struck by a schooner and sunk. The loss of life is immense -more than three hundred persons are reported; only seventeen being known to be saved out of three hundred and fifty to four hundred.
