THE PRINCE OF WALES AT QUEBEC

The New York Sunday Herald contains an ac count of the reception of the Prince of Wales at Quebec, on Saturday last, on which occasion the narrow streets of that ancient city were crowded with an immense mass of people. We quote from the account as follows:

"The streets are dressed with evergreens, sprines trees have been planted, arches formed. and flags are flying in every direction. Allealon the line of the Prince's route the regular soldiers are formed in a line.

The fleet came in sight of the citadel this afternoon. The view from the wharf was grand. The

river enclosed by mountains looked like a Hasheiya 5000, and Rashaia 2500. picture. The ships were dressed with flags and the shores lined with people. The scene would have appeared gay and animated, but the murky sky, through mist and muddy waters, gave it a dall appearance.
