THE CELEBRATION IN MONTREAL.
MONTREAL, Aug. 25.—The Building of industry was inaugurated by the Prince at 10 o'clock he performed the same ceremony for the Victoria Bridge.

The city is a sea of flags, and presents a splendid and joyous appearance. Great preparations have been made for the illumination to-night.

Gov. Goodwin of New Hampshire, Gov. Fish of New York, and other distinguished Americans are present to witness the ovations in honor of the Prince.

The Exhibition Building was opened to day with great éclat; after which the Prince proceeded to inaugurate the Victoria Bridge. There followed a brilliant illumination to-night. Weather favorable.

THE LATEST FROM EUROPE.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—The steamer Vandalia, from Southampton Aug. 18th, arrived at this port at 1 o'clock. P. M.

Loan Bill.

There is great political distrust at Paris, of the Italian and Syrian questions.

It is asserted that Garibaldi was in Naples on the 11th inst., conferring with influential circles relative to the Parliamentary elections which were to commence on the 19th. The object declared being the election of those who openly avowed republicanism.

A Naples dispatch states that the Garibaldians attempted a landing, but were partially repulsed, only two hundred having succeeded in landing, and they were driven into the interior.

The Prince Danilo, of Montenegro, was assassinated on the 13th inst.

If Garibaldi makes his expected attack on Vienna, efforts will maintain alone the conflict against all Italy's powers not interfering.

There is great gravity in the reports of reinforcements and supplies were being transported to Pola.

The steamer Veloce bombarded Monaco on the night of the 14th, retiring without result.

LATEST.

GENEVA, Aug. 15.—Doubtful dispatches reach the unopposed disembarkation of eight thousand Garibaldians on the 10th. Also the evacuation of the Fortress Scylla by the Neapolitan troops.

MILAN, Aug. 15.—It is believed that Garibaldi intended to attack Austria, on the Croatian Coast, by disembarking his troops at Rapago.

It is thought that he will endeavor to create a revolution in Hungary and Croatia before proceeding to attack the Austrians in Venetia. Cruisers are keeping a rigorous watch on all the Coast.

The Hop crop in some districts in England is a total failure.

Chinese officials represent that Looh Chow has been sacked and burned. (The Imperial forces are reported to have joined the rebels.)

LONDON, Aug. 15.—Sugar firm. Coffee scarce and higher. Tea unchanged. Rice firm.

VICTOR EMMANUEL AND GARIBALDI.—A correspondent of the *Constitutionnel* transmits to us the following letter of King Victor Emmanuel addressed to Garibaldi, which he guarantees as "faithful." It is as follows:

"Dear General,—You know that when you started for Sicily you did not have my approbation. To-day, considering the gravity of existing circumstances, I decide upon giving you a warning, being aware of the sincerity of your sentiments for me. In order to put an end to war between Italy and Sicily, I counsel you to renounce the idea of passing with your valiant troops to the Neapolitan continent, provided that the King of Naples consents to evacuate the whole of the island, and to leave the Sicilians to deliberate upon and to settle their destiny. I would reserve to myself full liberty of action relative to Sicily in the event of the King of Naples refusing to accept this condition. As General, follow my advice, and you will see that it is useful to Italy, whose power of augmenting her merits you would facilitate by showing to Europe that even as she knows how to conquer so does she know how to make a good use of her victory."

The following is given as "not quite a literal report, as far as the sense is concerned, an exact translation of the true letter of reply, which Petta has brought home from Garibaldi for King Victor Emmanuel":

"Sir,—Your Majesty knows the high esteem and the devotion which I feel towards your Majesty; but such is the present state of things in Italy, at the present moment, I cannot obey your Majesty's injunctions, much as I would like to do. I am called for and urged on, by the people of Italy, to whom I have sworn, to resist, with whatever force I had, to restrain their feelings, until there is a more favourable moment would be desirable. But if I should now hesitate I should endanger the cause of Italy, and not fulfil my duty as an Italian. May your Majesty, therefore, permit me this time not to obey! As soon as I shall have done with the task imposed upon me by the wishes of the people, which groans under the tyranny of the Neapolitan Bourgeoisie, I will lay down my sword at your Majesty's feet, and obey your Majesty for the remainder of my lifetime."

"GARIBALDI!"

The letter is dated Melazzo, the 27th of July.

REPORTED RUSSIAN MARCH UPON CHINA.—According to a letter in the "Times" from Japan, 12,000 Russian soldiers were on the march towards Pekin. The writer is quite confident that something mysterious is on foot, and hopes the success of the allies may not be thwarted by Russia.

THE CONFESSORIAL REPUDIATED.—The Roman Catholics of Manchester, England, have given very extensive circulation to the following article. Some Roman Catholics, holding erroneous Christian views, have miserably perverted the Communion of the See of St. Peter, yea, denying the office conferred in the Holy Sacrament of Orders to be simply ministerial, and, shoring the assumption by the minister of God the judicial character in the Confessional, as destructive of the free grace designed by our Lord for sinners, in his institution of the Holy Sacrament of Penance, are desirous of obtaining, under special incantation of the Blessed Sacrament, an Associated Membership for earnest private prayer, in each other's homes, that God will of his grace remove this and other scandals from men's devising from his holy and immaculate church.

DOMESTIC.

SHOOTING A BROTHER.—The *Carlton Sentinel* gives the following account of a most brutal quarrel between brothers at South Richmond on the 22nd inst.

"It appears that the Brothers Finnegan, of Chalmid, have had trouble in regard to some land, attended with some petty law suits, one of which was to have been tried before Squire Verxa, on the day of the row. Owen Finnegan, arriving at the Magistrate's, was told that his house was burnt and his child killed. He immediately procured a gun, and started in the direction of home (2 miles distant). Startled and fearing mischief, Messrs. Verxa, Kirkpatrick, and Jacques followed and overtook him. He tried to get the gun from him, but allowed them to keep it after promising not to use it. They then followed him to his house—which was burning—and nearly destroyed, but found no one there. They sought gun, and started back again, and learned that Owen had shot his brother James wounding him severely in both legs. It appears that as Owen went towards the fire he saw James and two other men crossing a field,


