The Philadelphia Christian Observer introducing to its readers the following sublime ode translated from the Russian, remarks :--" It was written by one of their most distinguished poets Derhaven -The ode is said to have been translated into the Chinese and Tartar languages, written on a rich silk, and suspended in the imperial palace at Pekin. 


